U. S. MISSIONARY IS CAPTURED BY CHINESE BANDITS

PEKING, Wednesday, Jan. 7.—(By The Associated Press.) Dr. A. J. Shelton, a Christian missionary, was captured by bandits at Laoyakuan, near Yunnan Fu, on January 3 and is being held for ransom, according to reports received here.

His wife and two daughters, who have arrived at Yunnan Fu, say the kidnappers acted under orders of Yang Tien Fu, a notorious outlaw, who has been operating with 5000 followers, in the Kachin mountains.

It is said the object of his lawless acts has been to discredit the loyal governor for refusing to accept the terms of surrender laid down by the band.

The brigands stated they would treat their prisoner as a guest unless the military was employed to effect his release. Yang Tien Fu is reported to have been educated as a military officer in Japan.

Officials of the American legation here and Chinese authorities are investigating the case.

A message from Cincinnati Sunday gave the first information of the capture of Dr. Shelton. It was announced there that the Foreign Christian Missionary society, a Disciples church organization for which Dr. Shelton had for twenty years been a missionary in China and Tibet, had been informed by the state department of the capture, the department adding that it had demanded immediate action.

Dr. Shelton, who formerly resided at Anthony, Kan., was stationed at Batang, province of Szechuan, near the Tibetan border. The point where he was captured is in Yunnan province, which borders Szechuan on the south.

W. VON BRICKEN ABANDONS FIGHT TO REGAIN WIFE

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 13.—Wilhelm von Bricken, formerly attached to the German consulate here, who arrived here yesterday after his release from the federal penitentiary at McNeil's Island, announced that he had given up all hope of a reconciliation with his divorced wife, Mrs. Milo Abercrombie, as the result of the announcement of her engagement to Lieutenant Lyman K.

Swenson, U. S. N. Von Bricken served a sentence in McNeil's Island prison for violation of the American neutrality laws. Deportation proceedings are being pressed against him.

"It makes me extremely unhappy, but it cannot be helped," von Bricken said. "I hope she will be happy in her new life but I think it would have been better had the children been given the protection of their natural parents rather than have that responsibility placed in the hands of a stranger. I shall forget my marital troubles as far as possible and will concentrate all of my efforts toward winning the right to remain in this country and becoming a useful American citizen."

"I will omit my efforts to win my wife back. I expect when the deportation proceedings are over that my family will be permitted to come here from Germany so that we may enter on the business of stock raising on a large scale."

Von Bricken announced that he intended to remain in San Francisco until the deportation action is ended.

Published reports that her daughter, Mrs. Milo Abercrombie, former wife of Wilhelm von Bricken, German consular agent here, is to marry Lieutenant Lyman K. Swenson, U. S. N., were confirmed by Mrs. George McGowan, a society matron here today. Mrs. Abercrombie divorced von Bricken while he was confined in the federal penitentiary at McNeil's Island for a breach of the United States neutrality laws.
