

# HAYS STATES WHAT G.O.P. STANDS FOR

### Chairman Republican National Committee Gives Key Note Speech in San Francisco—Political Self Determination Is Answer—Party Stands for Whatever Its Members Stand for—Great Need Is Roosevelt Square Deal.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 14.—Will H. Hays, chairman of the republican national committee today finished his conference with western party chairmen here and prepared to leave tonight for Reno, where he will spend one day in conference with Nevada republican managers. He will return to San Francisco Friday.

The national chairman and several state chairmen of western states were luncheon guests here today at a leading club.

Last night Mr. Hays delivered a keynote speech to the Pacific coast. He said in part:

The republican party is the party of the future or there is no use for the party. Our past record for 50 years of achievement is the best guarantee to the country of our future fulfillment, but it is only on our future fulfillment that our usefulness will depend. The republican party must and shall continue to be the instrument in this country to apply to new changing conditions the wisdom of experience and the efficacy of honest, zealous service.

Political parties are not instruments of individuals to use for personal aggrandizement. Political parties afford the means by which thinking men and women first promulgate and then apply principles for the control of the influences which surround the place they call their home. Hence the reason, the strongest of all reasons, for the interest of women in politics.

During the war every act of the republican party in state and nation was determined solely by how it could contribute most to the sum total of war good. In that crisis, with the control of the government in other hands, the republican party, true to its traditions, became the war party of the country, insisting upon the right of full participation, giving the limit of our blood and our treasure, standing immovable against an inconclusive peace, and crying continually to the party in power, Carry on! Carry on!

#### No Time for Carping

So now in the trying times ahead the republican party shall determine its every footstep by how it can contribute most to the country's welfare. There has not been and will not be any geography, political or physical, in the patriotism of this country. It is no time for little things, for petty jealousies, carping criticisms, pulling or hauling, but fearlessly, in a spirit of patriotism with our eyes solely on the country's welfare the republican party can and will solve the problems. We attribute honesty of purpose to the opposition and our message is that each party make its business to see which can go the farther in developing plans and executing purposes for the welfare of the people and the glory of the nation. Let this be the real contest between political parties in this country. There are two natural inquiries from women new in politics: (1) What does the republican party offer the women? (2) What does the republican party stand for?

#### Opportunity to Women

"The republican party offers the women everything we offer the men. The only just rule for a political party is that the rights of participation in the management of the party's affairs must be and remain equally shared and sacredly equal. The republican women in the country constitute one-half of the party's membership. In many states this has long been so. In the presidential campaign of 1920 it is my very earnest hope and well-founded belief that it shall be so everywhere.

The republican women came into the party actively not as women but as voters, entitled to participate, and participating, just as other voters. Their activity is not supplementary, ancillary or secondary at all—they are units in the party membership, and where the suffrage for them is now they come in just as men have come in when they have

reached the voting age. They are not separated or segregated, but assimilated and amalgamated, with just that full consideration due every working member of the party in the rights of their full citizenship.

There is to be no separate women's organization created within the party, except and only in those cases where such an arrangement may be needed temporarily as an efficient aid in the complete amalgamation which is our objective.

#### What G. O. P. Stands for

To women and to men alike the party offers the right of political self determination, and that is the answer to the second query. "What does the party stand for?" Within the republican party there is and must be full political self determination. It is entirely up to the party membership to say what the party's purpose shall be, what its policies shall become. This fundamentally is what we offer to the women—the chance to express themselves. We have no hard and fast set of rules, no unalterable list of dogmas which we present to women and say, "There it is. Take it or leave it." Instead, we offer the open forums in the party organization which is always open to conversion from within. With this complete participation, it is your problem as much as it is the problem of the men to determine what the party stands for, and thus you work out the answer.

#### A Square Deal

Our problems are largely economic. The industrial difficulties in this country, which at the present moment seem to be overwhelming, can be and, I have implicit faith, will be solved in one way—by finding exact justice and enforcing it.

It is simply a matter of Roosevelt's "square deal"—exact justice for labor, exact justice for capital, and exact justice for the public, the third side of the triangle which must not be lost sight of.

To that end we must develop a reasonable method of honest and efficient labor to neutralize an interest in the business to which labor is expected to give its best efforts. Pending this development, the equilibrium between production and wages must be established and there must be justice for all—exact justice, the justice of right and reason.

Justice for all—and do not forget that the American people still know what exact justice is.

#### Officer Is Beaten

When the troops dispersed the crowd they extended their cordon in the direction of United Den Linden where throngs filled the street. An

officer who chanced along was severely beaten by the crowd.

After a short recess the house visibly quieted down and President Fehrenbach, rising from his seat, told the deputies the day's casualties had reached a total which would occasion profound regret and that further deliberations, could, under the circumstances, hardly be expected to continue.

The deputies received the announcement standing and then left the chamber.

#### Crisis Thursday

Independent socialist leaders plan to continue demonstrations whenever the industrial council bill is up for debate, and it is expected the climax will be reached on Thursday, which is the anniversary of the deaths of Dr. Karl Liebknecht and Rosa Luxemburg, radical leaders, who were slain while being taken to Moabit prison.

The entente missions arriving here today are reported to have indicated their intention to call upon their governments for military protection if demonstrations are threatening.

#### Martial Law Declared

PARIS, Jan. 14.—(Havas).—Martial law has been declared throughout Germany with the exception of Bavaria, Saxony, Wuertemberg and Baden, according to Berlin advices. Dispatches from Bern say that during the demonstration before the reichstag building in Berlin yesterday two policemen were killed and two are missing. Ten others were wounded. Twenty members of the crowd which attempted to rush into the building were killed and forty wounded.

matched with Willard for a fight in Chicago under the auspices of the Salvation army. Both Willard and Dempsey appeared, ready to go on, but Mayor Thompson stopped the exhibition although \$70,000 worth of tickets had been sold.

#### Reflects on Civilian Army

"Jack Dempsey, in addition to appearing in exhibition matches for war charities in Brooklyn and San Francisco, also appeared twice in New York, Denver and nearly a score of smaller cities, and also in many of the cantonments and naval training stations.

"Those who are charging Dempsey with being a 'slacker' because he worked in the shipyard—and helped to raise nearly \$100,000 for the various war charities—apparently have overreached themselves in their charges, for by that contention they are smudging the reputation of every other exhumed man who served the nation in the army at home—and served it so nobly—by working day

and night in the essential industries, so that the war could be brought to a speedy and successful conclusion."
