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APPLE PRICE IS TOO LOW FOR ANY ENGLISH EXPORT

The controlled price for American apples in England will not be changed, according to a communication just received by Arthur M. Geary of Portland, from Charles M. Simons of London. Mr. Simons writes that despite the efforts which he promised to make when in Portland some four months ago, the British government has decided to maintain the same maximum price for American apples. The price is about \$4.25 a box, varying with exchange rates.

This controlled price is too low to permit the shipment of high class northwestern box apples to England with a profit to the shipper. Heretofore England has been the chief foreign market open to the northwestern English Newtown apples, and the loss of this outlet at this time, when the apple market in this country is far from active, will be marked.

When the freight of at least 60 cents a box between northwestern points and eastern export points is added to the f. o. b. price, plus 85 cents a box, which has been charged this season for transporting apples from the Atlantic coast to England, and then the various handling charges and considering adverse exchange rates and the controlled maximum price that the fruit is permitted to bring, the incentive to exporting high grade apples this season is shown not to exist.

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DON'T GET THE LINE TANGLED.

IN this fish controversy it is well to concentrate our attention upon fish. The more extraneous matter brought into the melee, the less chance of getting what we want, and what in common justice, the people of Southern Oregon should have.

So in our opinion it is the part of practical expediency to forget about the legislature and forget about the fish commission. As predicted in this column several days ago, there is no hope for relief in either quarter. When the people of Oregon, as a whole, take enough interest in politics to send men to Salem who will represent them, instead of private business, there will be some chance. But not until then.

So the best thing to do in regard to the fish commission and legislative farce is forget it. There was no reason to expect anything else. What is,—is.

But it is not too early to lay plans for a fight before the people of the state. The cannery interests, of course, have represented this fight as that of a few rattle-brained fly casters against an Oregon industry,—an attempt to drive out a legitimate business, so that a few idlers may catch more fish and waste more time.

As long as the people believe this sort of bunk there is no chance of relief. What the people must be shown is that trout fishing is in the first place one of the most valuable resources Southern Oregon has, and in the second place that unless the cannery at the mouth of Rogue river is removed, or its methods entirely changed, the steel head trout will go the way of the bison and Dodo.

If the steel head can be preserved without doing away with the cannery well and good, if they can't be preserved without doing away with the cannery well and good again. But they must be preserved. That's the entire question in a nutshell. That's the point to keep perpetually in mind.

Let the political scramble go its sweet way. Sooner or later it will play itself out. But concentrate on fish, and protecting the fish. A campaign on that line is sooner or later bound to win, because it is just and right.

We don't agree with L. J. that its a crime to be a partisan. If there's a genuine principle involved its a crime not to be, but if there isn't, then partisanship is merely a waste of energy and time. But perhaps that is what L. J. really means.

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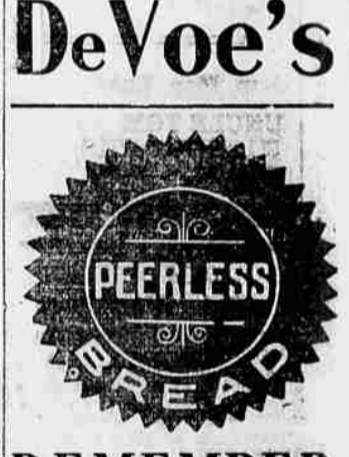
