**"FISH FIGHT TO BE CARRIED TO PEOPLE"—THOMAS**

SALEM, Jan. 15.—(Special to Mail Tribune.)—The commercial fishermen's machine, which so overwhelmed the opposition in the house Tuesday, put on a second exhibition in the senate this afternoon and, while meeting with more vigorous opposition, rolled on with resistless momentum and put up to the governor for his signature the Bean-Norblau bill creating a new nine-man commission the members of which are to be elected by the legislature at the present session, and which is frankly admitted is intended to elect, out of the governor's reach, the very men whom he has publicly stated he would discharge from their position if the matter was left to him to handle.

The fight in the senate this afternoon lasted from 2 o'clock until after 6, and was enlivened by heavy bombardment from both sides, but the machine had not in its fine work before the fight came up on the floor and the advocates of the sportsmen's side of the controversy were rolled out flat. The final vote was 17 to 12.

The committee appointed at the last session of the legislature under a bill of which Representative Sheldon was the author, to design and secure a special medal to be presented by the state to each Oregon soldier, sailor or marine enlisted during the world war, has finished its work and today members of the legislature were given a chance to see the medals which will be distributed to the men within a few weeks through the American Legion. The medal is of a beautiful and at the same time unique design. The Sheldon bill carried an appropriation sufficiently large to provide a medal for each man entitled to the same, and for the expense of securing a correct and complete list of such Oregon enlisted men and for the distribution of the medals.

Senator Thomas, who has been a leader in the fish fight, and who made a splendid address of over an hour and a half in the senate this afternoon, stated tonight that the fight would be carried straight to the people and will not be considered settled until that final tribunal had passed on the matter. The manifest disposition of the bunch who have carried their points at this session, to talk "harmony" and "compromise" is a clear index of their realization that they have won only the first round and that was on the battle field where they were at their best; the final test to come on another field where they could count on no such advantage as they have had here.

**METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH ESTABLISHES TOWN HEADQUARTERS**

Rev. J. Rudolph Sasnett, recently appointed to the First M. E. church of this city, has established a study and church office in the heart of the downtown district. He has engaged a suite of rooms in the Jackson County bank building. Mr. Sasnett said, "It is my conviction that the church should be as close to the people, and as 'get-at-able' as any servant of the public. Christ was not the conceiver of the idea that the minister should be a monk or a recluse. When I came to Medford it was with the purpose to serve every community interest and to so relate the church to the life of the people that any one in need of spiritual counsel or help might find that aid immediately available. People need legal counsel, so the attorney puts out his sign by the side of the road where the race of men pass; Medical aid may be found in any office building, and the grocer, the butcher, the haberdasher, the amusement man and every one who ministers to human need may be readily found at the center of civic life. Why should not the Kingdom of God be brought as close to the people as any of these things?"

**ASHLAND C. C. ASKS PORTLAND TO MAKE GOOD HER CLAIM**

ASHLAND, Jan. 17.—A test as to Portland's sincerity in professing to uphold this portion of the state in matters of vital importance to southern Oregon will be afforded by watching with interest what action the metropolis will take in response to several appeals or demands, rather— from this locality, notably one for legislative aid and moral support in behalf of making the Rogue river a stream free from encroachments of commercial fishermen. The following telegram from here on Friday, is an initial reminder to have Portland redeem some of its pledges:

Over thirty thousand people of Rogue River valley are striving for some rights to the fish in Rogue river as against the unjust monopoly of the commercial fishermen at the mouth of the river. We earnestly ask of your body that you give us the assistance which lies in your power, that these God given rights may be preserved for the people generally rather than monopolized by commercial profiteers.

**WALKER WHITESIDE AT PAGE THEATER MONDAY JAN'Y 26**
