CONDITION OF CHURCH TODAY A PITIFUL ONE

Evangelist J. A. Rippey spoke to an interested audience last evening at the Seventh Day Adventist church on North Riverside. His study was based on the Seven Churches of Revelation. He spoke in part as follows: The church as organized by the apostles has passed through some trying experiences. Various errors crept in until the climax was reached in 538 A. D. when the Devil joined the church, bringing in the superstitious rites of the Pagan philosophy. His argument was based on the following quotation: "It was permitted the church to transfer to pagan uses those ceremonies which the Pagans had wickedly applied in a superstitious worship, after having purified them by consecration, so that, to the great contempt of the Devil, all might honor Christ with those rites he (the Devil) intended for his own worship." From "Paganism in Christian," page 8. Various quotations were read verifying the above statement. He cautioned the congregation against accepting any doctrine not having a "thus saith the Lord." "The seventh period of the church of today is a pitiful one," said the evangelist, since it is spoken of as being in a like wretched condition. It is hard to arouse her members in spiritual things because the pleasures of the world have

more attraction today than the plain teachings of the word of God. Throughout the discourse he held out as the hope of the church, the study of the word and repentance toward God.
