### ASHLAND CITIZENS ASK GOVERNMENT FOR \$53,400 REBATE

ASHLAND, Jan. 20.—Chrome development work to the extent of \$53,400 is reported by Myron E. Horr and H. K. Welch, of this city, incident to the demand created during the war, and regarding which statements have been filed with the government supporting claims for compensation incident thereto. This claim is the largest one reported in the list, including localities throughout the state, except Portland. L. H. Van Horn, of Jacksonville, reports \$11,000; Floyd Pearce, Eagle Point, \$1598; Charles M. Warren, Rogue River, \$700; Jno. W. Pomeroy, Central Point, \$3900. Of Medford residents F. S. Miller, Gus and T. T. Nichols report \$2500; Wm. Ewing \$3200, and E. G. Harding approximately \$1000. Through Josephine county the claims are more numerous than in any other portion of the state. The schedule of claims as published is accompanied by an announcement that the government will refuse to pay such unless substantiated by evidence that the federal authorities specifically authorized individuals to go ahead with this development work, necessitated by demand arising during the war.

B. R. Willits, well known former resident, died lately in Portland after protracted illness, having suffered from a paralytic stroke. He was familiarly known as "Rush" Willits and enjoyed a wide acquaintance hereabouts in earlier days, being a man of genial presence and kindly characteristics. He leaves a widow and two daughters. The late Levi Willits, Klamath county capitalist, who also died recently, was a brother of "Rush."

The familiar Eleven O'clock club gathered in social reunion once more on Tuesday evening this week at Memorial hall, the motive being one in honor of Mr. and Mrs. Clark Bush, who are to leave Ashland soon to locate in southern California. It is needless to add that this friendly gathering in Memorial hall awakened many happy memories of the jolly events transpiring in those headquarters now chronicled in the social annals of the past.

Unless unforeseen complications arise, it is conceded that the post office will remain in its present quarters indefinitely under new lease.

Archie Strickland, formerly connected with the city electric light system, later on employed in the same capacity at Kennewick, Wash., is now located in Portland as an electrician, the family residence being at 875 Albina avenue.

Funeral services of Mrs. Altea Norton, who died on Sunday, were held Tuesday at Stock's parlors, interment being in Mountain View cemetery. Deceased was 83 years of age, and a native of Canada. She was the mother of E. N. Norton and Mrs. J. P. Halfhill of this city.

The local roundup's activities have passed into history, and its affairs have been wound up, without any attachment or foreclosure proceedings either, inasmuch as all bills have been accounted for and paid in full without rebate. The question now arising, in view of celebrating next summer, is what particular attraction to stage in order to take the roundup's place. If anybody can formulate a scheme, it's not too early even at this date to suggest it, in order that plans may be made accordingly.

Funeral services of Miss Amy Grubb, who died last Saturday, were held at the Presbyterian church on Monday, conducted by the pastor. Interment was in Ashland cemetery, the Rebekahs having charge of services at the grave. The deceased was a native of this vicinity, and was a young woman universally esteemed. Besides a widowed mother she leaves a large family of brothers and sisters who are bound together by more than the ordinary ties of kinship. Sam of Spokane, and William of Marshfield, brothers of the deceased, were here among other near relatives to attend the funeral.

It is also reported that Moor will resign the postoffice job, joining the back to the soil movement.

the newly organized Farm Bureau Co-operative exchange, the membership of which includes representation from both Jackson and Josephine counties, and will represent this part of the county in behalf of the new organization.

One of the most substantial places in town has lately changed hands, this referring to the Carson buffalo property on Palm avenue, purchased by J. G. Conger, of Farmington, Wn., who will have possession in the spring. The Beaver Realty Co. made the deal. Conger formerly owned and occupied ranch property near Talent, which he sold to advantage and went north. Now he returns to Ashland for a permanent residence.

Hum Pracht has not been seen in the uptown district much of late, the reason being that his time has been occupied in conducting the depot hotel, owing to the illness of J. P. Wolf, landlord of this popular house. The Wolf family are to go to southern California for an indefinite stay, and Pracht will continue management of the hotel, a property with which he is familiar, having been the landlord of it himself in former years.
