ASHLAND, Jan. 23.—Al Kader temple holds a ceremonial at Portland on Saturday night, Jan. 24. Among visitors from Ashland will be W. H. McNair, Stuart Saunders, Geo. Dunn, and probably others. Portland residents, members of Hillah Temple are keeping wires hot and mails busy in requisitions on the Ashland organization for 1920 cards, without which difficulty will be experienced in paying homage at the shrine of Al Kader. The delegates from here will stop at Eugene either going or returning from Portland, and perfect arrangements for holding a Hillah Temple ceremonial in that college town, the date of which will probably be postponed from the time as originally mentioned, Feb. 7. Saunders is potentate of Hillah, and his delegation on this trip will keep talk on Portland's "midwinter night's dream" in order not to be adverse to assimilating bits of knowledge which will perfect the staging of the big time at Eugene.
