Last Monday evening, the high school faculty met in regular session with the superintendent. Some of the problems discussed were: Requirements for reading circle work; information semester class room results; requisites of good physical condition of class rooms; requisites of good board work; requisites of good note book work; advantages of mechanizing the necessary routine of class room in order to have more time for real teaching; the importance of boys and girls getting a vision of what school work should mean thru the personal touch of the teacher.

On Tuesday evening, the entire faculty of the schools met in regular session. The greater part of the time was given over to a report by Miss Wilson of the Roosevelt school, of the Oregon State Teachers' association after which many of the points were discussed freely by the instructors.

Director Newton Van Dalsen of the state board of vocational education visited the schools Tuesday in behalf of the organization of the part time school for boys and girls between 16 and 18, who have not finished the eighth grade. Superintendent Davenport is now outlining a plan for this work which will be started the second semester if all the details can be adjusted by that time. Further information will be given later.

The youth of all the elementary schools of the city Wednesday, just before passing for the afternoon semester, gave the salute to the American flag and sang patriotic songs. It is the plan to have them do this frequently for it is believed that this is just another way of instilling patriotism in our boys and girls.

A plan is under way concerning a visiting afternoon in the public schools by parents and patrons. The schools are always pleased to have patrons call for special exercises, and yet it is firmly believed that there should be far more visiting by parents of the regular academic work of the class room for then a clearer understanding may be had by pupil, parent, teacher, and supervisor of the many complex problems.
