FIVE BEASLEY CHILDREN SAFE IN LOS ANGELES

Much sympathy and kind attention has been given the five young Beasley children ever since they left Medford last Wednesday night on their journey to Louisiana. Mrs. Octavia Beasley, their mother is sick in this city and the children were cared for by the local Red Cross. On their journey they will be met by Red Cross officials and the local chapter receives word every day by wire of their safety and whereabouts. At Shreveport they will be met by an uncle.

The following dispatch tells of their arrival in San Francisco, and today the Red Cross received word of their safe arrival in Los Angeles:

Five children, the eldest of whom is but 13, and the youngest 18 months, are here today, traveling alone from their home at Medford, Ore., to Shreveport, La. They are going to join their mother. Their father died in Medford some time ago.

The children, Sybil, 13; Phyllis, 11; Wilford, 10; Lois, 8; and Adolphus, 18 months, were taken in charge here by the travelers' aid society, agents of which will watch for the kiddies along the route. They are the children of Mrs. Beasley of Medford.

"City health officers must wire this office government rate collect outbreak of influenza; after outbreak wire daily number new cases, deaths and influenza pneumonia by letter any facts regarding type and mode of spread; mobilize local resources to conduct possible severe epidemic. Mark telegram government rate collect.

1919 INCOME TAX COLLECTOR HERE FEBRUARY 16TH

Income tax returns will soon be due and Postmaster Mims has just received a notice from Milton A. Miller, internal revenue collector of Oregon, giving the information that Deputy Collectors Wimberly and Dalrymple will be at the city hall in Medford from and including February 16, to and including February 25, for the purpose of assisting taxpayers in making their 1919 income tax returns.

Every single man whose income is \$1,000 or over and every married man with an income of \$2,000 or over must file an income tax return, and each person so affected must prepare a statement of his entire receipts from all sources during the year 1919, and also of the amounts claimed as allowable deductions arising through the conduct of his business, or otherwise, and be ready to submit the same to the deputies on the dates above mentioned. The deputies will give all possible assistance and instruction.
