Facts Concerning the Income Tax

Unmarried men and women who are bread-winners for others are granted special exemptions on their earnings before figuring the income tax now being collected. Although a return must be filed by every unmarried person, and by every married person living apart from wife (or husband), who had a net income of \$1000 or more during 1919, recognition is made in the law of the home burdens carried, and relief from excessive taxation is especially provided.

In addition to the ordinary personal exemption of \$1000, an additional exemption of \$1000 is granted to "heads of families"; and there is also provided an exemption of \$200 for each dependent under 18 years of age or who is mentally or physically defective. The \$200 for each dependent may be claimed by any taxpayer who is the chief support of such dependent. This is not confined to dependents who are members of the family or relatives. It does not include others who are earning their living, and it does not apply to the wife or husband of the married taxpayer, even though such person may have become a total burden.

The person who claims exemption on "head of a family" must qualify in two respects: first, he must be the head of a household; secondly, he must be the chief support of the family. WORLD DEBT NOW \$200,000,000,000 \$40,000,000 IN '14

NEW YORK, Jan. 26.—The world's debt was estimated by the National City bank today at \$200,000,000,000, compared with \$40,000,000 in 1914.

Paper currency throughout the world increased 50 per cent since 1914, while the gold reserve behind it increased only 10 per cent, according to statistics compiled by the bank. The face value of paper currency of thirty principal countries, which totaled \$7,250,000,000 in 1914, had increased to \$10,000,000,000 at the time of the armistice and to \$50,000,000,000 in December, 1919, exclusive of \$21,000,000,000 issued by the Russian soviet government.

Germany, Austria, Hungary, Turkey and Bulgaria show an advance in note circulation from \$1,200,000,000 in 1914 to \$12,200,000,000 at the close of the war, and \$18,770,000,000 in December, 1919; the gold reserve falling from \$600,000,000 in 1914 to \$227,000,000 in 1919, the ratio of gold to notes declining from 49.7 per cent in 1914, to 2.5 per cent in November, 1919, and 1.7 per cent in December, 1919.

In the eight principal countries of the allies, paper notes increased from \$1,165,000,000 in 1914 to \$2,426,000,000 in 1919, while the gold reserve increased from \$516,000,000 to \$1,450,000,000, a ratio of 44.3 in 1914 and 59.9 in 1919.

CAPTAIN BLAIN GIVEN 2 WEEKS TO PLEAD CASE

SEATTLE, Jan. 26.—Captain John F. Blain, former north Pacific district manager of the United States shipping board, today was arraigned and given two weeks in which to plead to an indictment returned against him here last week charging him with accepting secret commissions on sales made by the Stewart Davit and Equipment company of New York to the board while he was manager.

February 9 was set as the date on which Captain Blain will plead. His attorneys said today they would probably file demurrers to the indictment.

United States District Judge Jeremiah Nerter today denied Captain Blain's motion that his bond of \$10,000 be reduced.

Announcement was made today that the grand jury will not take up any more shipyard cases for two weeks. Bert Schiesinger, special assistant attorney general, who is handling the prosecution, will return from San Francisco within two weeks from now and will place more evidence before the jury.
