FOREIGN EXCHANGE TO NEW LOW LEVELS

NEW YORK, Jan. 25.—Rates on French, Italian and German exchange dropped to new low levels in the local market today.

Demand sterling later dropped to \$3.59 1/2, a new low. Franc checks dropped five centimes from the opening quotation to a new low of 12.32 and lire checks went down to 14.44.

THEY'RE ALL FOR IT.

THE Portland Spectator refuses to endorse any candidate for president until he comes out for Americanism.

But our impression has been they have all come out for Americanism and nothing else. Poindexter, Wood, Monroe, Gerard,—two republicans and two democrats, but their patriotic hearts beat as one,—“We stand for 100 per cent Americanism.”

So will Palmer, and McAdoo and Jim-Jam Lewis,—Lowden, Harding and Lodge. A presidential candidate this year will no more be without his stamp of 100 per cent Americanism than his humble origin and loving family. Its the one plank in every platform that can be taken for granted.

The test, of course, will come not in assertion but definition,—not in blandly claiming 100 per cent Americanism, but in telling the people just what 100 per cent Americanism is.

Probably this is what the Spectator has in mind. When the class of candidates begin to particularize, so as to please the people of Milwaukee, on one hand, and the people of Kalamazoo, on the other, then there will be reason to take notice.

But until then asking for an American test from the presidential candidates would be about as conclusive as asking for a meat eating test at a dog show. They are all for it.

AS TO PLATFORM AND ISSUES.

MR. BRYAN won't endorse Mr. Hoover until he knows where he stands on the campaign issues.

Then we fear Mr. Bryan will not come out for Herbert immediately. For there ain't no such animal, thus far. With the treaty and League of Nations out of the way,—the only real issue in the campaign is that of the personality and character of the candidate.

There is no issue on the tariff, none on the currency, none on war, none on prohibition, none on suffrage, none on trusts, none on militarism, imperialism, or any of the other isms.

Of course the democrats will lambast the republican record and the republicans will lambast the democratic record, but the people more this year than ever before are going to vote not for the party but for the man.

And that is where Mr. Hoover is going to stand head and shoulders above his opponent, regardless of which party he represents or who his opponent happens to be. As to this platform,—anyone can write a platform these days adapted to any party. Par Example:—

For 100 per cent Americanism. For a square deal between capital and labor, opposing abuses by either, and demanding justice from both. For an adequate army and navy, without militarism. For a higher standard of statesmanship and a lower cost of living.

For the hero who fought overseas, and the hero who did his bit at home, for the women God bless them, and for the babies, for the simple habits of our forefathers without their simple incomes, and,—but what's the use.—

Anyone can write a platform that any republican or democrat will run on. The important point this year is not the platform but who is on it.

The congress was called in special session to reduce the cost of living, but thus far has reduced nothing but the joy of it.
