

### BEET GROWERS TO ORGANIZE AFTER CALIFORNIA PLAN

DENVER, Colo., Jan. 26.—Five hundred delegates representing sugar beet growers' organizations of Colorado, Wyoming, Nebraska, Idaho, Utah, Washington, Wisconsin and Michigan gathered here today to attend the first national convention of the beet growers.

The primary object of the convention which will continue for three days is the formation of a cooperative organization which will handle the entire beet output in a manner somewhat similar to that used by the citrus growers of California in marketing their products. It is the contention of the beet men that prices are too low to compensate the grower with more than a living wage and that the profits of the industry can be greatly enlarged by a systematized marketing plan.

The refiners are completely in control of all markets according to the beet growers and have been responsible for maintaining low beet prices.

A number of representatives of the federal government, including John J. H. Atwood, assistant to Attorney General Palmer, was in attendance, and an effort will be put forth to secure federal cooperation with the new marketing organization.

### WANT NAMES MEN WHO DIED IN WAR

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 26.—The nearest relatives of men who died during the world war are requested to send the full names of the soldiers, sailors or marines making the supreme sacrifice, to the American Legion Post in their locality as soon as possible, in order that the men may be remembered in the presentation of memorial certificates of the French government.

Presentation ceremonies will be held by local posts of the American Legion on Feb. 22, 1920, Washington's birthday.

With the names of the men who died, should go the names and addresses of the next of kin, and the probable place where they can be reached on February 22nd.

In arguing against the motion the prosecution offered as exhibits a number of newspapers and articles, including some printed in the Butte Bulletin and the Seattle Union Record, which he alleged would tend to influence jurors in favor of the defense.

Court was to resume at 1:30 o'clock this afternoon, at which time it was expected the work of selecting a jury would begin.

### Prosecution Sustained

Objection to the presentation of such exhibits as had not made their appearance since the order of the court granting the change of venue from Lewis county to Grays Harbor county, was partially sustained by the court, when Judge John M. Wilson ruled that he would consider only matters alleged to have occurred since the venue to this county was granted. In making the ruling the court upheld the contention of counsel for the prosecution that certain of the exhibits had "already been judicially determined and ruled upon."

### Legion Men on Hand

MONTESANO, Wash., Jan. 26.—Eleven alleged Industrial Workers of the World went on trial at 10 a. m. here today for the murder of Lieutenant Warren O. Grimm, one of four former American soldiers shot and killed at Centralia, Wash., Nov. 11, 1919, while marching in an Armistice day parade.

The trial which will be heard before Judge John M. Wilson, Olympia, Wash., was transferred here from Lewis county, where Centralia is located, because of alleged bias on the part of the people of that county.

Scores of witnesses, attorneys, taxsmen, newspapermen and others are here to attend the trial. American Legion men in their khaki uniforms are here from all parts of the Pacific northwest, as Lieutenant Grimm was commander of the Centralia Legion post and the parade was being held under the Legion's auspices.

### SINCE ARMISTICE SUICIDES GROW THRUOUT WORLD

NEW YORK, Jan. 26.—Since the signing of the armistice there has been a constantly increasing number of suicides everywhere, according to a report issued today by the Save-a-Life league. In Germany, Russia, Syria and other foreign countries where the number has been very large, the cause is attributed to despair because of miserable living conditions brought about by the war.

The report tabulated 5121 cases of suicide in the United States during 1919. Of the professions lawyers led the list with 12, of which twelve were judges; 36 victims were physicians, 28 teachers and 11 clergymen. The list includes twenty presidents of large business concerns and fifty prominent club members, millionaires and wealthy society women. Unhappy marital relations were responsible for 350 tragedies.

Men outnumbered women 2987 to 1637, but of the child suicides, 252 were girls and 225 boys. Newspaper editors appeared to be immune.
