FIGHT TUBERCULOSIS IN LOCAL LIVESTOCK

The government has started a crusade on tuberculosis in livestock, and Jackson county is one of the first counties in the state of Oregon to benefit by this movement. Dr. Osborn, deputy state veterinarian, is in the county and will be here for several days. He will have headquarters in County Agent Cate's office, and all farmers interested in having their stock tested should have their applications at Mr. Cate's office as soon as possible.

This testing is all done free to the farmers and is a great opportunity to determine whether tuberculosis is spreading in each farmer's herd or not. Farmers are urged to take advantage of this opportunity and list their herds immediately, so the county can be covered in a systematic manner.

U. S. FARMERS AND R. R. LABOR UNIONS FOR GOV'T CONTROL

WASHINGTON, Jan. 27.—Continuation of government control of the railroads for at least two years was asked of President Wilson again today by representatives of farmers' organizations, the American Federation of Labor and the four big brotherhoods. A large delegation, composed of many of the same persons who called at the White House last December 17, went to the executive offices with a letter for the president.

Sentiment in favor of government operation, the letter said, has increased during the six weeks since the first request was made, "until we can accurately state that this is the preponderant desire of the farmers and of organized labor forces of most of the states of the union."

The return of the roads, the letter declared, would involve an increase in freight rates of 15 to 25 percent since a revenue of close to a billion dollars would be needed which would mean, it added, that an increase in the cost of living, as estimated by your director general of railroads, of at least four billion dollars a year.

Frank Morrison, secretary of the American Federation of Labor, representing President Gompers, presented the views of the American Federation of Labor and gave detailed data of the costs of living.

At the conclusion of the conference Secretary Taft said he would present the matter to the president.

LINE OF ATTACK IN N. Y. ASSEMBLY TRIAL IS CLEAR

ALBANY, N. Y., Jan. 27.—Council for the assembly judiciary committee investigating charges of disloyalty against the five suspended socialist assemblymen indicated at their trial today the line of its attack.
After reading into the records a clause from the national constitution of the socialist party providing for expulsion from the party of members voting to appropriate funds for military or naval purposes, John H. Stanchfield, committee attorney, referred to the oaths of office taken by the five assemblymen and then read from the New York state constitution an article specifying that it shall be the duty of the legislature to provide funds for maintenance of the militia.
