Public School News Items

Mr. James Spofford has been appointed assistant in mathematics to succeed Mr. James R. Van Dyke. Mr. Spofford is a graduate of the University of California. The new instructor will take up his duties next Monday, Feb. 2.

The assignment of instructors by grades will appear in a later issue of this paper.

Pupils will report to their regular buildings and rooms for report cards and assignment cards next Monday at the usual time. Promotions will be made at that time under the direction of the several principals, and assignment made by principals.

The two days, Thursday and Friday, will be set aside for instructors to make out reports, grade, check, etc., the work in detail so that the regular work of the second semester may be begun with a clean slate.

All pupils between the ages of 16 and 18 who have not finished the eighth grade work and who have not been in school up to this time are requested to file their names in the office of superintendent so plans may be completed for the part-time school. If this is done, considerable difficulty and time will be saved to all concerned. This applies only to the above class for all pupils under sixteen and who have not finished grade 8 are to be in the regular elementary schools for the usual session.
