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MURDERER OF IRON NERVE WILL DIE WITHOUT CLERGY

OSHSING, N. Y., Jan. 29.—Gordon Fawcett Hamby, the 26-year-old confessed murderer, bank robber and train bandit, will go to the death chair in Sing Sing prison tonight without the aid of clergy, if his wishes are respected by Major Lewis F. Lawes, warden.

The iron-nerved prisoner, whose career of crime took him from coast to coast and ended in Tacoma, Wash., with his arrest for the murder of two bank employees during a \$13,000 robbery of the East Brooklyn Savings bank in December, 1918, began his

last day on earth with apparent indifference to his fate.

He seemed as cool as when he sat in the district attorney's office in Brooklyn after his arrest and recounted robbery after robbery, and murder after murder in which he said he had been implicated. He partook heartily of a breakfast, the viands of which he had selected, and smoked innumerable cigarettes.

Hamby confided to Major Lawes last night that he had planned to cheat the death chair by committing suicide in his cell today. He changed his mind, however, he said, because Major Lawes had treated him so squarely and been "such a good fellow."

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 29.—The transport Mount Vernon, which is returning to San Francisco in a leaking condition after having put out from here on January 23 on a secret mission, is in no danger and is proceeding without assistance, according to a radio message received by Major General Carroll A. Devol, chief of the army transport service, from Captain C. J. Bruguiere, master of the ship today.
