

### FLU QUARANTINE FOR MEDFORD IS TO BE ENFORCED

It is the decision of the city health board to strictly quarantine all cases of so called Spanish influenza and we would urge the hearty cooperation of all physicians and all persons occupying a position to which other persons are subordinate and under their control to report at once all cases of influenza occurring among their subordinates and all persons who have suspicious symptoms to the health officer. They are expected to refuse to permit such persons under their control to remain at their work so long as suspicious conditions exist.

Instructions from the state health board are as follows, viz.: All persons, whether physicians, practitioners, healers, owners or keepers of rooming houses, hotels, restaurants, boarding houses, dairy farms, superintendents or managers of private or public hospitals or sanatoria, visiting nurses, heads of schools, teachers in common and Sunday schools and heads of households are required to placard premises and immediately quarantine all cases of so-called Spanish influenza, and report to the health officer all circumstances which would reasonably cause one to suppose that a case of Spanish influenza might be developing, carefully informing the health officer having jurisdiction over the habitation, or place of employment, or residence of the person infected. Quarantine in every case, to be strictly maintained until raised by the health officer.

There is no known preventative inoculation against the so-called Spanish influenza. The adequate enforcement of these regulations will be the best known method of preventing the spread of the epidemic, and the health officer within his jurisdiction is charged with the strict enforcement of these measures.

L. Myron Boozer of Medford, moderator of the synod of Oregon of the Presbyterian church, presiding.—Oregonian.

### DEBS LAST SPEECH IS READ AT TRIAL

ALBANY, N. Y., Jan. 29.—Eugene V. Debs' "last speech before his vote was silenced," by a penitentiary sentence of ten years for violating the espionage act was read into the record today at the trial of the five suspended socialist assemblymen being tried by the assembly judiciary committee on charges of disloyalty.

In his speech, made before socialists in Cleveland last March, Debs, declaring he spoke "as a socialist, a revolutionist and a bolshevist," praised Lenin and Trotsky "as the greatest statesmen in the modern world," and expressed defiance of the laws of this country and the supreme court. The speech was distributed in pamphlet form by "the city committee of the socialist party of Greater New York," according to the prosecution.

### JACK JOHNSON WILL RETURN TO U. S. A. FOR TRIAL

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 29.—Jack Johnson, former heavyweight pugilistic champion of the world, plans to return to the United States at once to face charges pending against him in Chicago, according to a letter shown the Associated Press yesterday by Johnson. The former champion is confident he can arrange legal difficulties in time to fight Jack Dempsey before the latter meets Georges Carpentier of France, and asserts Dempsey must meet him before he can claim the world's championship.

The letter shown by the former champion was written by him to Charles F. Clynne, United States district attorney in Chicago. It said Johnson would go to New York by the way of Havana arranging through the American embassy here for federal officers to meet him in New York. Johnson requested Clynne to give him 36 hours of leeway after he arrived in Chicago so that he might secure bondsmen and make other legal preparations.

Johnson asserted yesterday that he weighed 213 pounds but would go into training immediately after reaching the United States and would be able to easily make his old fighting weight.

Jack Johnson was tried in Chicago early in 1913 on charges of having violated the Mann "white slave law" and being convicted was sentenced to a year's imprisonment in the Federal penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kas. Johnson appealed but before the case was argued before the higher court he forfeited his bail bond of \$45,000 by fleeing from home near Chicago to Montreal, Canada.

Late in June, 1913, he sailed for Europe and has not been on American soil since that time.

CHICAGO, Jan. 29.—Charles F. Clynne, federal district attorney, who prosecuted Jack Johnson, then heavyweight champion, today said he had received no communication from the negro since he left Chicago. Mr. Clynne would not comment upon the probable reception of Johnson should he follow out his announced intention to return to Chicago and face the charges against him.

Johnson's indictment grew out of allegations that he paid the railroad fare of a woman from Pittsburg to Chicago.

### SENATORS LOAF ON THE TREATY ISSUE

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—Negotiations between democratic and republican leaders of the senate who apparently have approached a deadlock on the peace treaty compromise will not be resumed until tomorrow, the meeting of the bi-partisan committee planned for today having been postponed because of the absence of Senator Lamont, of Wisconsin, one of the republican leaders.

#### Wilde Meets Ertle Tonight.

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Jan. 29.—Jimmy Wilde, the British flyweight champion will make his third bid for title honors in this country tonight when he meets Mike Ertle, a St. Paul, Minn., bantamweight, in a scheduled 10-round no-decision contest.

### CITY CHILD HAS 5 TIMES CHANCE OF COUNTRY COUSIN

NEW YORK, Jan. 29.—"The poor little child," who has the misfortune to be born in a city has just five times as good a chance of reaching maturity as his country cousin, according to Dr. Thomas D. Wood, of Teacher's college, New York.

Speaking before a teachers' conference in Belvidere, N. J., yesterday Dr. Wood cited figures based on a survey of 500,000 children to support his contention. The figures showed country children to lead city children in teeth defects, defective tonsils, adenoids, malnutrition and breathing defects.

"Ignorance, prejudice and lack of health supervision," were given by Dr. Wood as the principal causes of poor health in the country.
