

EVIDENCE IN TWO TRIALS SHOW PURPOSE OF I. W. W. IS TO OVERTHROW U. S. A.

ALBANY, N. Y.—Proponents of the "dictatorship of the proletariat" held that the first step must be seizure of the government by any means possible and the taking over of industry by force, according to a pamphlet read at the trial before the assembly judiciary committee of the five suspended socialist assemblymen charged with disloyalty.

The pamphlet, published by the Jewish socialist federation of New York was translated from the Hebrew by Charles M. Robinson, a department of justice operative, who was recalled to the stand today.

Purporting to give views of both proponents and opponents, the pamphlet asserted the former held preparation must be made for revolution and class dictatorship. Upon the seizure of the industries, they would be run by working men's Soviets, according to the program.

In discussing the topic the socialists and the democratic state, the pamphlet asked why should socialists enter legislative bodies, "where do socialists fit into the state?"

"Socialists," it set forth in reply, "seek to enter into the government for two reasons: First, to be nearer the doors of government councils, and second to hinder this character of work in any way possible. The first is the more important as it gives the socialist a chance to get into the strategy of the government thereby enabling him to carry out his program better. It is true that not always in this aim reached. The bourgeoisie atmosphere which he breathes gradually infects him and he begins to make compromises."

The pamphlet defines socialism as "a red movement, with blood in its veins," asserting that "in America we have had only the echo of what happened in Europe," the book added the

"The great task," continued the pamphlet, "is to create an army ready to make social revolution when the moment arrives." The time for class struggle, it added, "is here."

In his effort to prove that the I. W. W. is attempting to overthrow the government Mr. Askren cited the following quotations, among many others, which he read from radical pamphlets:

"The proletariat learns that school and church and press have as their primary object lulling him to quiet."

"The methods of the ballot box are the methods of the mob."

"The proletarians sole attitude is that of opposition—he is all revolutionary against the customs of modern life—and the point of attack against them is the workshop, where he meets the enemy daily."

"We are not satisfied with a fair day's salary for a fair day's work. Labor produces all wealth; labor should own all wealth."

"Modern government is but a shadow and not a substance."

The rows of defendants sat without changing facial expressions as the attorney read the morning reading from I. W. W. literature and interpreting his readings with comments that the quotations proved the intention of the state that the I. W. W. organization is attempting to overthrow American institutions by use of force.

FAVOR A DIVISION R. R. LABOR UNDER PRIVATE CONTROL

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—Continuation after the end of federal control of railroads of the boards of adjustments set up by the railroad administration to decide controversies arising under the application of wage orders and in other disputes between the railroads and their employees was recommended in the annual report today of W. S. Carter, director of the division of labor of the railroad administration.

Outlining labor conditions as he saw them on railroads prior to government control and the railroad labor situation when government control of railroads began, Mr. Carter said:

"One of the principal purposes of the creation of the division of labor was to provide means whereby the controversies that constantly arise between railroad officials and employees would be promptly and equitably adjusted. Inability to adjust these controversies under past practices resulted in strikes, threatened strikes, or a constant unrest among employees—to the extent that the efficiency of the service had greatly diminished at the time that the railroads were taken over under federal control."

"It may be truthfully said that at the time the roads passed under federal control the morale of railway employees had sunk to a low degree."

"It was with the knowledge of this alarming situation; and with a determination to restore harmonious relations between employees and the railroads and thereby increase the efficiency of the railroads that the division of labor of the railroad administration was created."

"During the year 1919 a considerable number of minor strikes occurred. Practically all of which were not authorized by the organizations of which the employees were members. The major proportion of these strikes were adjusted thru the initiative of the division of labor."

PROFESSIONAL POLITICIANS IN BOTH PARTIES FIGHT NOMINATION OF HOOVER

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—While vastly entertaining to the average citizen, political conditions throughout the country are extremely disturbing to the professionals in all parties.

William Jennings Bryan continues to function as the stormy petrel of the democratic party, while President Wilson remains silent as to his personal plans.

Senator Hiram Johnson of California is the ogre of the republican organization, with even a greater capacity for making trouble than Mr. Bryan.

Herbert Clark Hoover is viewed as a positive menace by the dominant machine factions in both organizations.

Hoover Damages Programs

Of the three men Mr. Hoover apparently constitutes an agency thru which the best laid plans of the two big political organizations may be thrown out of kilter. While he has not had a personal hand in the nomination of the movement to bring about his nomination for president on an anti-machine basis, the members of the republican and democratic national committees and state bosses throughout the country afford him full credit for having caused the greatest amount of damage to their respective programs.

The feature of the Hoover movement that is causing the greatest embarrassment to the professional leaders of both parties is the spontaneity of the favorable response with which the suggestion was received. Scarcely a month has elapsed since the world presented an analysis of the qualities that seem to make him a desirable presidential candidate to establish the fact that the bosses of the two parties do not look on him with favor, a consequence in itself which adds to his attractiveness as a prospective presidential candidate.

Independence Is Disabled

Their chief and almost sole objection to him as the candidate of either party is his independence of both—his refusal to permit any political organization to pin a machine badge on him. While there has been no reversal among party leaders to adopt a plan of treating the Hoover boom, it seems to be the desire of the leaders of each party to make Mr. Hoover the candidate of the other.

Republican bosses in control of the national committee are manifestly perturbed at the cardinal spirit in which the World's suggestion that either one or both parties nominate Mr. Hoover has been received by progressive adherents. Consequently the republican bosses are trying to prove that Mr. Hoover is really a democrat and that the party of which President Wilson is the leader, should nominate him, if he is to be nominated.

This same attitude toward Mr. Hoover is equally true of the democratic machine leaders. Both are advancing suspicions and entirely illogical reasons to convince the voting public that Mr. Hoover cannot be both democratic and republican and that he must without further loss of

time select the standard under which he would fight.

Frank Admission Cited

The reasons for the professional objections against Mr. Hoover as a presidential candidate are far to seek. He has never been actively affiliated with any political organization. He has exercised his privilege to vote for candidates rather than parties.

His frank admission that he had voted for republican, progressive and democratic presidential candidates in the last 20 years not only illustrates his complete independence of machine domination but included the very best reason for the opposition to him on the part of the two organizations.

Both democratic and republican leaders, as a rule, frankly regard Mr. Hoover as an enemy, at least he is not viewed as an ally, much less a shabby figure that will permit himself to be controlled by the men who may hold the power over the two parties in their hands.

Opposition Is Explained

The opposition of the mechanics in control of the republican organization is based entirely on the fact that Mr. Hoover is regarded as a progressive and that he would unalterably oppose the domination of their party by the reactionary element which plans to select a man of their own kind for president.

They realize that in any event Mr. Hoover would not stand for the perpetuation of the stand out influence that now control the committee and have its goal as written a platform reflecting the spirit of reactionism.

There is absolutely no reason at present to justify the belief that Mr. Hoover will appeal to any party. He

2913 DEER KILLED PENNSYLVANIA 1919

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Jan. 30.—Pennsylvania hunters last year killed legally 2,913 male deer weighing 378,690 pounds. They also shot illegally 119 male fawns and 207 does. The deer hunters got 472 carcases and those who went after rabbits killed 2,719,879. Turkey shooters got 5,181.

Fatal accidents exceeded former years, 45 persons having been killed and 125 wounded.

The state bureau is paying out about \$1,700 a day at present to those who present pelts from taxonomic animals at this season. This bounty is paid from the revenue from hunters' licenses of which 393,000 were issued.

PUNJAB TROUBLES ARE DUE TO H. C. L.

LONDON, Jan. 30.—A white paper report on the disturbances in the Punjab, India, issued today, says that the special contributory causes in the agitation at Amritsar were speculation, discontent over the prices of commodities, dissatisfaction with the income tax and an attempt to rouse Islamic feeling among the lower classes out of sympathy with Turkey.

Regarding the developments at Lahore, the report says that economic conditions, the cost of food and clothing and the rental rates contributed to the discontent of the working classes, but that the ready support given to the forces of disorder by the trading class could only be explained by the general causes affecting the Punjab as a whole.

SUDDEN DROP PRICES WOULD BE DISASTER

LONDON, Jan. 26.—Lower prices will be slow in coming, said Frederick McKenna, former chancellor of the exchequer and now chairman of the London City and Midland bank, addressing stockholders today. Any attempt suddenly to bring about a decrease in the cost of living, he said, would mean disaster.

He has not lifted a finger to obtain the endorsement of either the republicans or the democrats. It is quite probable that his advisers in both parties will encourage the organization of committees in various parts of the country to work for his nomination on a non-party basis.

AUSTRIA WILL VOTE ON CONSTITUTION

VIENNA, Jan. 28.—A general assembly of the provincial diet to frame a constitution for submission to the central government will be held the latter part of the month.

This meeting is in pursuance of the announced determination of the provinces or national states of Austria to secure the widest degree of autonomy and constitutionality, to limit the powers of the central government to the narrowest possible sphere.
