Bennett who as chairman of the Elks lodge sick and relief committee worked night and day during last year's flu epidemic, visiting the sick Elks and members of their families with flowers, was himself down with a bad attack of the flu. Mr. Bennett was a very sick man for a couple of days this week and his condition is now reported as improved. His son Lester is also sick at the Bennett home with chickenpox.

Probably no one person in Medford has brought so much joy to Medford homes within the past two years as has Mr. Bennett in his capacity of chairman of the Elks sick committee. Not only did he take flowers to the homes but he visited many of the patients personally, giving kindly words of sympathy and helping out the stricken homes in various ways. He seemed indefatigable and general wonder was expressed last winter at his ability to get around and visit so many homes. Why, he even did the house work for a week or more at the home of W. E. Walker, the local Standard Oil manager, when all the family were down with the flu and nurses and help could not be obtained. Hence it is that there is a genuine wish throughout the city that Mr. Bennett's illness will be a short one and that he will soon be on his feet again.

George Hilton and Everett Eads are the other members of the Elks sick committee this year, and as several members of the Eads transfer establishment are ill, requiring Mr. Eads' services most of his time in business duties, Mr. Hilton has been doing most of the sick committee's work for several days and has been kept busy night and day, for many Elks and their families are on the sick list.

### NOTED ARMENIAN WOMAN TO TALK IN CITY SUNDAY

Mrs. Otis Floyd Lamson (formerly Miss Armenouhie Tashlian, of Armenia) the wife of a well known Seattle physician, and herself a physician of note, will be in Medford a short time Sunday morning.

She is working in the interest of the Near East relief campaign the object of which is to provide funds to relieve the terrible conditions that obtain in Armenia and other portions of the near east.

The local committee desired to obtain the Page theatre in order to give the general public an opportunity to hear this cultured woman and brilliant speaker, but as her time is limited to the morning the plan had to be abandoned. However, she will make short talks at several of the churches during the Sunday school and church hours.

Mrs. Lamson, being a native of Armenia, is in possession of accurate information concerning that country and its people in general, and the conditions to which they have been reduced by the outrageous treatment of the Turks in particular, and her message is not only an appeal for aid to these unfortunate people, but is in itself both educational and intensely interesting. She is a graduate of several universities, a practicing physician, and a writer of note. That she is nationally recognized is shown by the fact that James W. Girard, former ambassador to Germany chose her as the representative in the northwest of the American Committee for Armenian Independence.

The people of Medford will gain much in hearing her discuss the eastern question more fully.

### Yudenitch Released

In western Russia the Lettish advance along a 90 mile front has attained a maximum penetration of about 65 miles. Difficulties between Poland and Lithuania continue and threaten to become acute owing to acts of aggression by partisan detachments. Allied representatives are trying to mediate there.

General Nicholas Yudenitch, commander of the Russian northwest army in the offensive last fall against Petrograd, whose arrest was reported in advices from Reval, is said in semi-official quarters to have been released.

Private advices say General Yudenitch was released as a result of pressure exerted by French and British authorities at Reval.

### 57 Cases Portland

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 30.—Fifty-seven new cases of influenza have been reported to the city health bureau in the past 24 hours, bringing the total number in Portland to 179. No deaths have occurred in the last 24 hours and no existing cases are reported as critical.

There are now 14 patients in the influenza barracks at Second and Hooker streets. Additional beds will be installed to receive more patients at the barracks.

### Y.M.C.A. HAS \$515 FOR JACKSON CO. EDUCATION FUND

The educational service committee for Jackson county recently appointed by the Interstate Young Men's Christian association of Oregon and Idaho for the purpose of recommending for scholarships in vocational schools and colleges such ex-service men as may be qualified for and desirous of pursuing further study along lines to their liking which it might not otherwise be possible for them to secure, will meet at the Medford public library, Friday evening, Jan. 30th, at 8 o'clock. The nature of this meeting will be to make preliminary plans for the work to be done.

The national war work council of the Y. M. C. A. had left after its work in the service approximately \$1,000,000. This fund it has seen fit to distribute over the country according to population of the states. The Interstate Y. M. C. A. is now allotting its proportion to the counties in Oregon and Idaho in like manner, \$515 being the amount which the committee for Jackson county has at its disposal. When this amount has been spoken for by applicants for scholarships, the recommendations made and approved, the work of the committee will be at an end. ### U. S. FOOD EXPORTS ARE CUT IN TWO

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—Food-stuff exports in December amounted to nearly double the value brought in during December, 1918, while exports of foodstuffs were \$30,000,000 below the total for the same month a year ago, according to figures made public today by the department of commerce.

Foodstuffs imported in December were valued at \$84,941,027 compared with \$43,136,499 in December, 1918, while exports were \$172,000,261 as against \$203,983,316 in December a year ago. Imports of foodstuffs in 1919 amounted to \$1,100,579,028.

Compared with \$713,622,806 in 1918, and exports for 1919 totaled \$2,641,190,953 against \$1,953,255,213 for the previous year.
