MINIMUM WAGE EPISCOPAL CLERGY DETERMINED UPON

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 5.—A scale of minimum salaries for the clergy of the Protestant Episcopal diocese of California has been fixed by the board of church extension, to be put in effect at the earliest moment that the finances of the board will permit. It was announced at the diocesan convention in session here by Charles L. Parsons, coadjutor bishop of the diocese.

Unmarried clergymen are to be allowed \$1,200 annually, under this scale, married men \$1,500, with an additional \$100 for each minor child. Missionaries in ten out of twelve cases are to be furnished rectories. The present salary for missionaries is \$95 a month, the increase amounting to about \$30.

Bishop Parsons stated that investigations showed that of 12 selected occupations at Seattle only the waiters received less than the clergy. He said the church and the laity suffered from the low salaries even more than the clergy because a clergyman hard pressed to meet his bills could not do his church work well.

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COLLECTING MILK BOTTLES BURNING QUESTION DEBATED

PORTLAND, Feb. 5.—Mrs. Morton Meyers of Harrington, Wash., and Thomas Owens of Kirkland, Wash., were among the speakers at last night's meeting of northwest milk dealers, when the question of how to keep track of milk bottles and how to collect them, was discussed. Milk dealers asserted that the bottle question was an important problem involved in the price of milk distribution. They declared that housewives who pay a deposit of five cents on bottles costing the distributors about nine cents, should not be allowed to keep the bottles, put up preserves in them, or sell them.

The address of A. C. Fleweger of Oakland, Cal., on "cleaning up the bottle situation," started the discussion. Fleweger declared he had demonstrated that any driver can pick up ninety five per cent of the bottles on his route while making deliveries. F. B. Flood presided at yesterday's session.
