

SPLENDID MEETING LOCAL LEGION AT THE MOOSE HALL

One of the best and most successful meetings of the Peabody Post of the American Legion was held at Moose hall last night with over 100 members of the legion and their invited guests, the Civil war and Spanish-American war veterans and Company D. O. N. G., present.

After a short business meeting the assembly was addressed by Colonel H. H. Sargent. The colonel gave a very interesting and entertaining account of German strategy in the several crucial movements during the war. His address was very much enjoyed by all present.

After Colonel Sargent's address, extemporaneous remarks were made by Blaine Klum, who much to J. J. Buchter's disgust, related how he was on the first ship to leave America's shore during the Spanish-American war for the Philippines and gave an amazing account of the capture of the island of Guam.

A G. A. R. member told how glad the Civil war veterans were that they could pass on to a younger set of men their obligation to inculcate patriotism and defend the country. Captain H. A. Canady of Company D gave a spirited address and asked the good will of the legion and other veterans present in the effort to secure an armory for Medford, where quarters would be had for all.

Captain A. S. Doig of the regular army asked all present to support the local National Guard company and to respect and venerate the uniform of the United States soldier under all conditions.

A court martial was hurriedly summoned by Acting Advocate F. P. Farrell, consisting of A. J. Vance, J. J. Buchter, Paul Leonard, Hob Denel and Floyd Williamson. Charges had been preferred against Seely V. Hall and C. Y. Tenewald. Upon motion of Comrade Perry the advocate for the defense, the court unanimously decided that both defendants be shot at sunrise.

During the evening Herb Alford's imperial orchestra entertained with a number of special selections and encores. The kitchen police had a hard time serving the crowd with refreshments and finally it was decided that each man present take his mess gear and pass by the K. P.'s in old army style.

Sunday, Feb. 22, under the auspices of the Medford post, the French government will present to the next of kin of soldiers and sailors who died during the great war, a certificate of recognition of service. The ceremony will be held at the Page theater and the public is cordially invited. On Feb. 23 the post's semi-annual ball will be held at the Natorium. This dance will not be a military ball but will be strictly informal and everybody is expected to have an enjoyable time.

FINED \$50 AND COSTS, GAFFING FISH GOLD RAY

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 5.—Five arrests have been made by deputy game warden in Oregon in the last week for violations of the state game laws. Four offenders were brought to trial and fines imposed.

Victor Mosier, Ray Moore, Alfred A. Best and Bert Price, all of Mount Vernon, Ore., were arrested on charges of killing deer and having deer meat in their possession. Mosier was fined \$35, having offered venison for sale, and Moore and Best were fined \$25 each. Price is yet to be tried.

Charles James was fined \$50 and costs for gaffing fish in the Gold Ray fish ladder in the Rogue River, and must, in addition, serve 30 days in jail. Emory Whitlow of Newburg, arrested February 2 for shooting game birds from the state highway near Newburg, was fined \$25 and costs.

JUDGE WEBSTER OF SPOKANE GUARDED FROM I. W. W. THUGS

SPOKANE, Feb. 5.—Threats declared to have been made against the life of Superior Judge R. M. Webster of this county, who issued a permanent injunction January 5 forbidding Industrial Workers of the World activities here, have caused the assignment of a squad of police detectives to guard him, it became known today.

The threats, according to Commissioner John H. Tilsey of the department of public safety, were voiced against Judge Webster at a recent meeting of Industrial Workers of the World in a Montana town. For the last two days, Commissioner Tilsey said, Judge Webster has been under constant guard while on the bench, at his home and on his way to and from the court house.

It was declared that while similar threats have been made against Prosecuting Attorney J. B. Lindsay, upon whose position the injunction was issued, no guard has been assigned for his protection.

Operation of the injunction, it was declared today, prevents invocation of habeas corpus proceedings in the case of defendants arrested for its alleged violation, and denies them a trial by jury. Two men arrested for alleged violation of the injunction were found guilty of contempt of court and sentenced to terms in jail.

Previously these defendants in court here had been acquitted of criminal syndicalism in connection with I. W. W. activities, and recently a superior court jury disagreed regarding the guilt of forty others tried on similar charges.

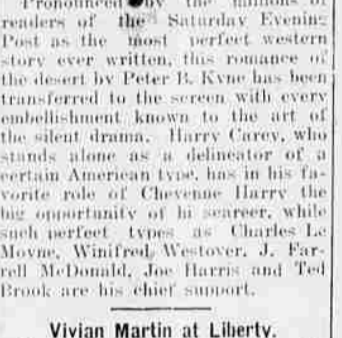
AWARDS D.S.C. FOR LETTING CONTRACT

START TIMING OF ALL JACKSONVILLE CALLS

Beginning February 1st the Home Telephone company, in compliance with the recent order of the public service commission, began keeping a record and timing all Medford-Jacksonville calls. 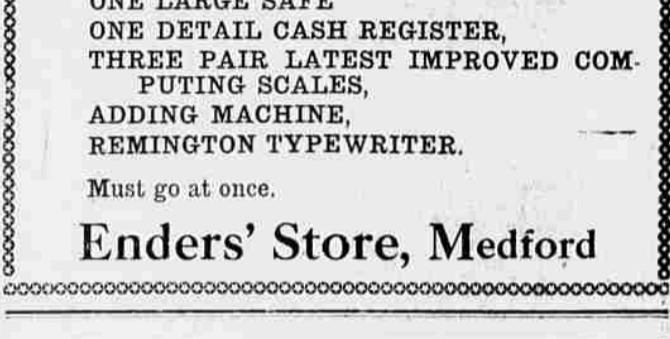
