NEW EPISCOPAL DEANERY HEAD QUARTERS MEDFORD

At the Diocesan convention of the Episcopal church in Oregon, held recently at Portland, a new deanery was created, to be known as the Southeastern deanery. The new deanery comprises the churches in Jackson, Josephine and Douglas counties, and is composed of the clergymen and lay delegates from the churches. The function of the deanery is to discuss and formulate plans for the good of the church and to stimulate the work of the church, especially its missionary work. Meetings of the clergy and lay delegates are held at least twice a year. The first meeting scheduled for the new deanery is to be held at St. Mark's church, Medford, Monday, May 10th, immediately following the visit of Bishop Sumner at St. Mark's on May 9th. The bishop and other visiting clergymen are expected to be present. The Rev. Wm. B. Hamilton, vicar of St. Mark's was appointed by the bishop to be the dean of the new deanery.

LOCAL SCHOOLS DISPENSE WITH SOCIAL DOINGS

The board of education, realizing the difficult situation that would have to be confronted at this time by the system and particularly as to the loss of time by pupils, who would lose perhaps one-half year of work if the schools were closed, instructed Superintendent Davenport to explain at this time that it would be advisable to dispense with all social activities and gatherings in any way connected with the schools. The principals were requested to take this matter up with teachers, student bodies and all other organizations working with the schools. This was done in all the schools, with the result that a hearty spirit of cooperation was manifested by pupils, teachers and all other organizations. It is the aim of the board of education and its employees to take every precaution and do all in their power to assist in solving the present epidemic situation in our city and community, at the same time sensing the critical condition that would ensue if our schools were to close. It is believed that, if such a method were pursued by the many other organizations in our city and community, as to social gatherings and activities that are not so essential, particularly at this time when it is imperative for the city and community to cooperate in this affair, that is of general welfare, the present epidemic might be more readily checked. It is hoped that other organizations will consider this problem and take similar action.

PARIS, Feb. 7.—King Nicholas, who has remained at the head of the royal Montenegrin government in spite of the fact that he was ousted by the national assembly of that country is understood to be in Albania preparing for a coup which may restore him to his throne and country. The former king has not been able to reconcile himself to the absorption of Montenegro by the new Soko-Slav kingdom and reports from Scutari say the Albanian Montenegrins are sympathetic to his cause. Albanian territory is now occupied by Italian troops who are said to be favorably disposed toward King Nicholas thru the fact that he is father of Queen Helena.

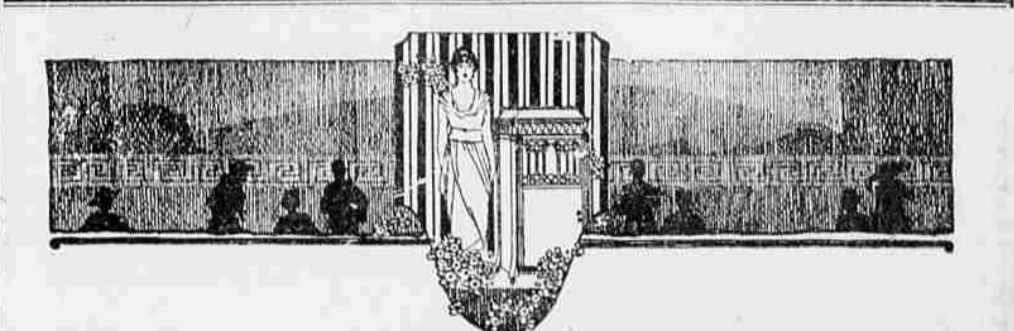
SEATTLE MAN HEAD OF FRUIT JOBBERS
