FOUR TEACHERS AT ALBANY RESIGN

ALBANY, Ore., Feb. 9.—As a result of the recent violent agitation on the part of Albany school teachers for increased salary and a refusal of the school board to grant the increase four teachers have resigned.
The teachers have already been granted a 15 per cent raise over their regular contracts but in a recent petition to the board signed by all but five of the instructors they requested another raise of 20 per cent. In a special meeting of the school board Saturday night this request was refused and the resignation of four teachers accepted.

POLICE UNABLE SOLVE PORTLAND MURDER CASE

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 9.—The man whose mysterious murder was revealed by the human fragments picked up in Sullivan's Gulch here Saturday, was of fair complexion, about five feet ten inches or six feet in height, weighed about 180 pounds and was 30 or 40 years of age.
This was the description prepared by Deputy Coroner Leo Goelich and detectives today, judging from the portions of the body which were found.
The efforts of the detectives to solve the mystery have been unsuccessful although practically every available man in the department is working on different phases of the investigation.
Fred Fuller of Boston and Pat McDonald of New York are named twice on the All-America track and field teams. Fuller is the 10-mile and cross-country champion and McDonald holds the shot-put and 56-pound weight championships.
