MUSTEROLE WILL NOT BLISTER

MAKING THE PEOPLE PAY.

WHY should the people pay for political propaganda for any party or for any faction?

White paper costs money these days. According to the postmaster general's report, it costs money to transport and deliver mail. In fact the other day Senator Smoot called attention to the great waste of white paper by printing needless speeches in the Congressional Record.

But today we are in receipt of two post cards from Senator Reed bearing the government frank and accusing both President Wilson and Colonel House of voting with Japan for racial equality at the Paris conference.

President Wilson when questioned regarding this matter particularly requested that he be excused from answering in the interest of international good understanding. But what does Senator Reed care for international good understanding when a personal grudge is involved.

Senator Reed has a perfect right to send out propaganda against the League of Nations or for it, for President Wilson or against him, as long as he pays the bill, or some organization or individual interested in such propaganda pays for it; but he has no right, and no other public official in our opinion has a right, to send out propaganda in the interest of any party or any faction, and charge it up to the American people.

Nominally Senator Reed is a democrat. But the complete paralysis of political lines is effectively demonstrated, by his bitter opposition to President Wilson and everything for which President Wilson stands and has stood. This latest blow below the belt is merely another example of his persistent animus and treachery.

POLITICS!

WHAT a pitiless business politics is! In many of its phases how degrading and contemptible. Here is a president of this country who whatever his shortcomings, or whatever his mistakes, has at least followed the right as God gave him to see the right, and sacrificed his health if not his life on the altar of his country.

President Wilson is through. He will never seek political office again. At the present moment he is a hopeless invalid, pretty well deserted by the leaders of his own party, and unpopular in the country at large. Why pick on him?

But the political instinct like the pack instinct, only sees a leader falter and the followers are on him tooth and nail, to destroy him completely. In the prize ring there is a rule against hitting a man when he is down. In the political ring there is no such rule, and politicians like Senator Reed never find it beneath them to take advantage of it.

MANY POLITICIANS TO ATTEND LINCOLN CLUB CELEBRATION

The banquet will officially open the national campaign in the state, and immediately afterwards the political pot will start to "boil." A regiment of candidates will also blossom immediately afterwards.
