

HARMONY REIGNS AMERICAN LEAGUE JOHNSON CURBED

CHICAGO, Feb. 11.—Factional strife in the American league vanished early today when after an all night session concessions put forward by President Johnson and his five "loyal" adherents, and the insurgent Presidents Comiskey of the Chicago club, Frazee of Boston, and Repper of New York, were accepted. President Johnson found his authority as league executive altered as far as major disciplinary actions were concerned, an arbitration board, reviewing committee of two members being appointed to investigate all punishments ordered in excess of ten day suspensions and \$100 fines. On the other hand it was agreed to dismiss three suits brought against him by the New York club.

Other points in the settlement of the suit which at times threatened serious consequences for the league's future included reinstatement of Pittsburgh Carl Mays, of the New York, whose purchase from the Boston Red Sox last summer started the trouble, to award third place in the American league race to New York, and to ap-

point a commission of arbitration to hold office for two years. Colonel Jacob Ruppert of New York and Clark Griffith of Washington were appointed on the arbitration board, which also will act as a reviewing committee. In case the board is unable to agree it was decided to submit the disputed to a federal judge in Chicago.

President Johnson's position was supported in the long executive session which preceded the reconciliation by Frank Navin of Detroit, James Dunn of Cleveland, Clark Griffith of Washington, Phil Hall of St. Louis and Connie Mack of Philadelphia. Colonel Ruppert headed the minority faction and was supported by Harry Frazee of Boston and Charles Comiskey of Chicago.

The National league owners, at a recent session, adopted a schedule of 124 games for the 1920 season and accepted new rules formulated at a meeting of the joint rules committee of the two major leagues.

A meeting of the National association of Minor Leagues drafted legislation to be presented at the joint meeting of major and minor leagues, which was expected to be held late today.

Western league club owners agreed upon a schedule for 1920 but did not adopt it. A special meeting will be held in Kansas City Monday when the schedule will be adopted and other league business transacted.

ASKS RENOMINATION II DISTRICT ATTORNEY

ASHLAND, Feb. 11.—The popular and well established firm of Father & Son will hold a joint "food sale" in banquet assembled, at the Armory in this city, on Friday evening, Feb. 20. This is in accordance with established custom annually, and it is not a misnomer to state that the firm partnership is both an old as well as a young one. The exclusive invitation list includes younger sons as well as non-Ashtarians. The boys, however, to be eligible, must have reached ten years and not overreached eighteen. Homer Billings is chairman of an extensive committee which is looking after details, with Rigg for an assistant, while to V. O. N. Smith falls the duty of publicity manager. All of these appointments implying that the event, which is not only a banquet but includes a varied program, will be efficiently directed. There will be accommodations for 400 this year, the feed will be at 7 o'clock, and the ticket sale will close at 6 p. m., Feb. 18. The price will be sixty cents, which it is expected that Father & Son will pro rate on a 50-50 basis without rebates.

Tucker, the property being adjacent to the home of the purchasers, who it is reported will speed up the production of spuds on the premises.
