

IRISH REPUBLIC DRIVE IN CHARGE FATHER POWERS

The Irish Bond-Certificate drive begins in Oregon, Feb. 15th and ends Feb. 23d. The purpose of the drive is to finance the elected government of the Republic of Ireland in projects of national reconstruction and for such other purposes as the government may decide. Bond certificates are issued in denominations of \$10, \$25, \$50, \$100 and \$500. The terms of payment are the \$10 certificate cash on application, the others, 25 per cent on application, 25 per cent in thirty days, 25 per cent in sixty days and 25 per cent in ninety days.

Dr. Andrew Smith has been designated as state chairman for Oregon by Frank P. Walsh, the national chairman. Dr. J. F. Reddy was named as county chairman for Jackson county by Frank P. Walsh. Owing to the absence of Dr. Reddy in the east, Dr. Smith has appointed the Rev. John Powers to act as county chairman. Bond certificates may be secured from him any time.

Frank P. Walsh sent the following telegram to Dr. Reddy at Medford from New York:

"Large numbers United States Liberty bonds offered as subscriptions. This indicates estimation in which first loan of Irish Republic held; also sets high standard. Suggest to all workers to encourage especially this feature. Forward Liberty bonds to me daily as received and verified; convert registered bonds into bearer bonds before forwarding. Use registered mail and insure contents. Accept Canadian money at par and forward to me by registered mail daily as received."

"Manchester, New Hampshire, quota sixteen thousand reports thirty-two thousand and more coming. Jersey City has passed quota seventy-five thousand, will exceed one hundred thousand. New York workers report numerous subscriptions from Chinese. Many soldiers in army camps are sending money direct to national headquarters. Reports from states where campaign is proceeding demonstrate flotation remarkably successful. Preparation and workers' effort are only essentials to complete success."
