

H. C. GARNETT IS LOCAL LEADER OF SALVATION ARMY

To what extent and in what manner the Salvation Army can most effectively exert its constructive social efforts in Medford and vicinity, will be determined by the Medford Advisory Board, organized Thursday at a meeting in the Public Library.

The board, which is composed of some of the leading men and women of the city, thoroughly discussed the advantages of the step before organizing, and came to the conclusion that the Salvation Army Home Service program for 1920 as explained to them by Warren A. Chilcote, an army field representative, offers a valuable opportunity for Medford to avail itself of the social service facilities of the great Salvation Army organization.

Hereafter the Advisory Board, which is headed by Mr. H. C. Garnett, will constitute the directing force governing the army work in this vicinity. Its members, including those who were elected to membership by those present, in addition to Mr. Garnett, the chairman, are:

The board members will first make a study of social conditions in the county, paying special attention to certain phases with which the Salvation Army is particularly equipped to deal. These include poverty, with particular reference to the old and infirm; the unemployed, with reference especially to dependent cases, juvenile delinquency and its contributory causes, and illegitimacy, including the disposition of the mother and child. The results will be embodied in a confidential report to the state headquarters of the army, to be used solely by them in appraising conditions here, and determining how the army should move to remedy it, or whether any action is advisable.

Similar boards are to be formed in every county, Mr. Chilcote explained, and will similarly review their fields and report, thus giving the state officials of the army a comprehensive view of the entire Oregon situation. They will thus be in a position to locate accurately the state sore spots, and concentrate their efforts if necessary at a particular point or points. In addition, the board will keep in close touch with the situation here, and opportunities for the army can be brought to its attention, or can ask for help whenever an emergency arises.

The army's numerous institutions in this and adjoining states, such as rescue homes, industrial homes, girls' boarding houses, employment bureau, and orphanages, can be placed directly and the services of the people of this country, or experienced army workers may be sent here, or even an army corps may be established here.

There is no suspicion that conditions in Medford and vicinity will be found worse than in any other city of similar population or location, but it is expected that the study will reveal the manner and places in which the Salvation Army may make its work more efficient.

Mr. Chilcote emphasized the point that care was to be taken to see that the army did not duplicate any work now being done by similar agencies, but he declared his belief that it has always covered a field not reached by any other organization. Formation of a strong board here it is felt, will give double assurance against any duplications of effort.

THREE RANCHES ON TALENT DITCH SELL FOR \$69,000

The value of irrigation is strikingly shown by the recent real estate activity in the district watered by the new Talent irrigation ditch. In the last few weeks there have been three large real estate sales aggregating in value nearly \$70,000 and more sales are to follow as the demand for alfalfa land with water is growing apace.

E. Renshaw of Medford recently purchased the Welborn Beeson property of 71 acres for \$23,000 and today Mr. Beeson is moving to his new home near Ashland, while a Mr. Fielding is taking possession as a tenant of Mr. Renshaw's Mr. Beeson, who is a large property owner, will now devote most of his attention to his Bear Creek and Neil Creek properties. The Beeson place just sold is highly improved with three sets of buildings and modern equipment in every respect.

Andrews Weidner in the same district recently sold his property of 94 acres for \$26,000 to James Barrett

of Ashland. Mr. Barrett will develop a modern stork ranch and put on a herd of pure bred short horns.

A third deal was recently consummated but the details are not released as yet for publication. It can be said as a fact, however, that a Gray Harbor man recently purchased a ranch for \$20,000 on the Talent ditch and will make his home there.

If any argument were needed as to the value of water the rush for property abutting the Talent ditch would supply it. There is now another buyer looking over the district who wants to buy 1000 acres with water, and an interesting announcement is looked for in the near future.

Resolution Delayed. After more than an hour's debate Chairman Jones of the commerce committee, objected to the immediate consideration of the Ashurst resolution on the ground that a concurrent resolution should be referred to committee. The resolution then was referred to his committee.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13.—A concurrent resolution directing the shipping board not to sell the 30 former German liners which the board plans to dispose of at public auction here

Monday except through regular public bidding after three months' advertising and then only if proper offers are received, was introduced today by Senator Ashurst, democrat, Arizona.

The resolution was offered in the midst of a debate on the sale of the ships. Senator Ashurst declared that it was a fact that the shipping board and the emergency fleet corporation intended to sell the vessels to the International Mercantile Marine for \$28,000,000. He said the vessels had a pre war value of \$154,000,000 and a present value of \$300,000,000.

Asked by Senator Borah, republican, Idaho, whether he had inquired specifically about the Mercantile Marine corporation Senator Jones replied: "I did not but I do not believe

there is any truth in the report. The administration officials are not of my party but I believe they are honest men and patriotic citizens. I feel satisfied that they have not entered into any such thing.

"I have been told from surveys made the board believes it will cost from \$50,000,000 to \$80,000,000 to put these ships in proper condition. I think that is a mad administration matter and I have confidence that it will be decided wisely."

Senator Jones added that Chairman Payne several days ago had requested a hearing before the commerce committee to explain the whole situation.
