RADOVAN DRYER AT CENTRAL POINT IS BURNED DOWN

A fire Sunday night destroyed the Radovan dryer at Central Point. The building about 105x75 feet, all machinery and equipment, including boxes, drying kilns etc., all the evaporated fruit and green fruit in boxes, were burned at a loss of \$30,000, partially insured. The fire caught at the north side of the building, supposed to be from defective wiring. There was no fire in the kilns and had not been for two or three days. The fire will not affect the Medford plant, but more equipment will be ordered to finish evaporating green fruit now on hand.
