Rev. Mr. Hoyt of Ashland, the S. S. missionary for the Presbyterian church, called on your correspondent Thursday afternoon. He was working in the interest of the drive for the Armenians, appointing soliciting agents and notifying the different sections of the country the amount that each was expected to raise for the cause.
