MISS ALLEN STATE NURSE IN MEDFORD TO ATTEND MEETING

Miss Jane C. Allen, state advisory nurse, who is in Medford this week in the interest of the annual meeting of the Jackson County Public Health association next Friday afternoon, reports great activity all over the state in the matter of county public health nursing. She has now in her office with the state board of health a list of ten counties in which it is proposed to place public nurses during the next few months. Eleven counties already have such workers.

Jackson, it will be remembered, was the pioneer county in the state to put on this work, Miss Allen having established the work here two years ago. Coos county came second, employing its first county nurse about eighteen months ago. The Coos county Public Health association, at the end of the first six months, put on two more nurses whose salaries are paid by local school boards. In addition to these two counties just mentioned, the following counties have nurses: Lane, Linn, Clatsop, Multnomah, Washington, Clackamas, Des Chutes, Umatilla and Union.

Everyone in Jackson county who is interested in better community health should consider himself a member of the County Public Health association and should welcome the opportunity to attend the annual meeting next Friday at 2:30 in the Medford public library. While the supervision of the county nurse is the first activity of such an association, it is only one of many that might well be undertaken as the association grows and becomes stronger. A dental clinic for school children, a well baby station where mothers may learn how to keep the babies thriving, a community health center, the matter of milk for school children who are under nourished, any one of these is a legitimate activity of such a community association.

This worth while work which Jackson county has been carrying on so efficiently for the past two years needs the support of the people and it is desired that the Friday meeting be considered as a rally to this cause.

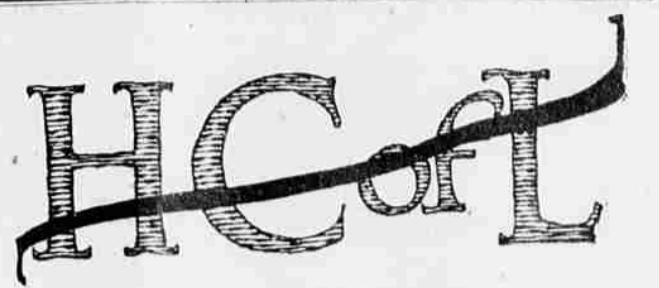

CANADA WANTS ONLY HOUSE SERVANTS AND FARM HANDS

NEW YORK, Feb. 19.—The only immigrants Canada wants are domestic servants and farm laborers, declared Dr. H. T. Rutherford, Canadian immigration official at Ellis Island, who yesterday ordered 30 Maltese on their way to the dominion deported to Malta. Because of labor conditions, he said, Canadian authorities are enforcing the exclusion laws to the letter.
