HOKE—Elizabeth N. Hoke, wife of H. E. Hoke, died Friday, Feb. 20, 1920, at the Sacred Heart hospital. Funeral services will be held Monday at 2:30 p. m. at St. Mark's church. Interment will be in the Jacksonville cemetery.

Mrs. Hoke was 31 years of age and was married to Mr. Hoke three years ago next March. Her maiden name was Elizabeth Norwood, and she was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John S. Norwood who have resided here for the past nine years. Besides her husband and parents she is survived by a sister, Miss Sarah Norwood.

Death was caused by pneumonia following influenza. She had only been ill a week. The pneumonia developed yesterday and she was taken to the Sacred Heart hospital in an ambulance Friday forenoon where her death occurred early last evening. A young woman of unusual charm and attractiveness, Mrs. Hoke will be missed by a large circle of friends, while the sympathy of the entire community goes out to her bereaved husband.

McWILLIAMS—In Newman, Calif., Feb. 17, 1920, Hugh Elvidge McWilliams, eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. F. G. McWilliams, of Ashland, aged 35 years.

"Elvidge," as he was familiarly known, was born at Neola, Iowa, in 1884, and came to Ashland with his parents in 1897, when he completed his schooling. For a time he was in the employ of the Wells-Fargo Express both in this state and Washington, and later on was connected with irrigation development work in southern and central California. It was while thus engaged, in the vicinity of Newman in that state, that his death occurred after brief illness. A weak heart, inherited since boyhood, prevented his entering the military service. Anxious, however, to do his mite in an industrial way, he worked

at shipbuilding pursuits during a portion of the war period.

His remains were brought to Ashland, and funeral services were held on Thursday afternoon at the family home on Church street, conducted by Rev. P. K. Hammond, of Trinity Episcopal church. Interment was in Mountain View cemetery. Elvidge was a quiet, unassuming young man of friendly demeanor, and was a dutiful and helpful son. Many deeply sympathize with the sorrowing family in a bereavement which is well nigh inconsolable. Besides his parents he leaves two sisters and two brothers, including Mrs. J. E. Peck, of Calexico, Cal.; Miss Frances, teacher in the schools of Oakland, Cal.; Charley, of Klamath Falls; and Kenneth, of The Dalles. In attendance upon the funeral Miss Frances and Charley reached home as a comfort to their parents in the trying hour of affliction, incident to which a large circle of friends extend a heartfelt sympathy.
