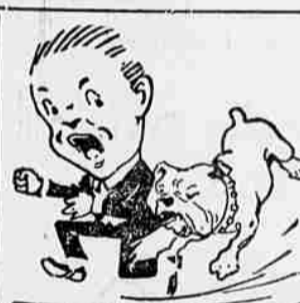

SNOW STORM IS GREAT BENEFIT TO THE VALLEY

The two and one-half inches of snow which fell Friday afternoon and last night, amounted to only .11 of an inch of rain when measured in water, but nevertheless does much good to the crops and fruit trees, and ended the long period of weeks of lack of precipitation. This snow is reinforced by 30 of an inch of rainfall, which preceded it yesterday. The total precipitation of Friday was welcomed by the farmers, orchardists and people generally, who hoped that much more was coming, but the snow stopped falling last night, the skies became clear, and this morning's prediction is for fair weather tonight and Sunday.

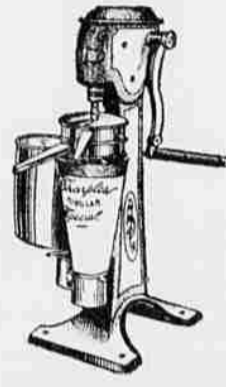
