

DECLARES OBJECTION TO ARTICLE 10 IS MERELY POLITICAL

SYDNEY, Australia, Jan. 25.—Australia's claim to the right to have one vote in the council of the League of Nations, was defended by Sir Joseph Cook, who was a delegate to the peace conference, in a recent speech here. Commenting on the attitude of a section of the United States senate favoring the League, he said:

"America objects to clause X of the league's charter. The objection is political from first to last. I believe that when the presidential election is over, all objection will end" on the question of Australian representation in the council of the league, Sir Joseph said.

"The Americans, led by Senator Lodge say that the British Empire should have only one vote. Senator Lodge's party objects to the change having five or six times the voting power of the United States. It is not a fair statement. All the other states in America have one vote."

Sir Joseph enumerated under this head Bolivia, Brazil, Cuba, Ecuador, Guatemala, Honduras, Liberia, Haiti, Nicaragua, Panama, Peru and Uruguay, and pointed out that the population of these countries were largely Indian or negro. "The 8-11th American states," he continued, "have 12 votes. How do the British dominions stand? New Zealand, Canada, Australia, South Africa, India each has only one vote."

"Australia's sacrifices in the war—60,000 dead—were greater than America's, and all died in an effort to make America safe. America was for three or four years out of the war while Australia was holding to keep her free."

"It has been said that there is no force by which to carry out the treaty. There is the force in the background, and other things—the penalty of ostracism and the boycott. No nation, unless it can conquer the world, can ignore these penalties."

JURY PRESENTS JUDGE RANKIN WITH A PIPE

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 25.—United States District Judge Frank B. Rankin of Spokane was impressed a jury trying a criminal action in his court that the jurymen wanted him in a body and presented him with a liar pipe at the conclusion of the case. It developed later that the criminal case quickly and determined also what sort of a pipe they should give him.

Judge Rankin said he usually smoked cigars, but would not accept the decision.

HOUSTON ENDORSES POINDEXTER BILL

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25.—Senator Poindexter's bill authorizing the department of agriculture to investigate the present shortage of wood pulp and present plans for relieving it should be passed, the senate agricultural committee was told today by David F. Houston, formerly secretary of agriculture. Mr. Houston wrote in reply to a request for information.

Forests in southeastern Alaska alone would supply at least half of the entire national demand if drawn upon, Mr. Houston said. The department, if authorized, would survey existing pulp areas, investigate those on the Pacific coast and in Alaska and consider measures for re-forestation of the eastern and Great Lakes states, he said, "where the industry has become unduly centralized."

KENTUCKY WETS TRY NEW STUN

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Feb. 25.—The Kentucky Distilleries and Warehouse company yesterday laid before Judge Walter Evans a petition alleging the eighteenth amendment to the constitution was unconstitutional, had the petition dismissed and an appeal certified to the supreme court of the United States, all within fifteen minutes.
