Problems of community importance will be discussed by Miss Fowler and methods of dealing with the same suggested. Any one desiring to attend these lectures is most welcome. During an interview with M. Paderewski, the correspondent asked him if it was true he would accept the nomination as president of Poland. "I don't think I shall be invited to become president," the great pianist replied. "I hope to devote the rest of my life to composing music. I am convinced an era of peace and prosperity for Poland has begun and feel my political mission is finished."

LONDON, Feb. 27.—New York dispatches telling of the work of the Cunard line in the formation of a great British shipping enterprise designed to capture Germany's former traffic in emigrants and freights between central Europe and America are featured in the Daily Mail. Before the war German lines subsidized by the German and Austrian governments were enabled to defy competition. The Mail says the Cunard line is negotiating for the purchase of large dock space and sheds at Hamburg formerly owned by the Hamburg-American line.

### AUSTRALIA ACCEPTS DAVIS CHALLENGE

NEW YORK, Feb. 27.—Formal acceptance of America's challenge for the Davis cup, emblematic of the world's tennis championships was received here today from Australia. The cable message was addressed to the United States Lawn Tennis association by Thomas H. Hicks of Sydney. This will be the first Davis cup matches for the United States since 1914 when the event was held in this country. As the draw for the preliminary matches for the United States since losing the chase of entries the national association expects to know early in March what team it will meet in the preliminary event.

### WILD DOGS DESTROY AUSTRALIAN SHEEP

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27.—Destructions by packs of wild dogs are causing Australian sheep owners heavy damage, according to official reports received here. A delegation of stockmen recently showed a loss of fifty thousand sheep in South Wales alone in a few months time. The delegation requested government aid in the erection of a "dog road" fence about a district comprising almost forty thousand square miles.

### NO MORE PASSPORTS FOR PICTURE BRIDES

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 26.—The Japanese government will receive no applications for passports for "picture brides" to the United States after today. It was announced here by T. Ohto, Japanese consul general. No passports will be issued after February 29, although those receiving passports have six months in which to use them.
