CENSUS RETURNS SHOW BIG GAINS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28.—Population statistics for 1920, announced by the census bureau today included: Lima, Ohio, 41,306, an increase of 9,798 or 33.3 per cent over 1910.

Hazleton, Pa., 32,267, an increase of 6,815, or 26.5 per cent.

Paducah, Ky., 24,735, an increase of 1,078 or 8.7 per cent.

Porto Rico's population is 1,295,226, according to final returns from the 14th annual decennial census as given in a cablegram from San Juan today at the census bureau here. This is an increase of 177,814, or 15.9 per cent over 1910.

SOVIET DEMANDS RETURN ROZANOFF

VLADIVOSTOK, Feb. 18.—(By the Associated Press)—Demand will be made upon Japan for the return of General Rozanoff, former governor-general of the maritime province, to face trial on charges of crime while executive of the province of which Vladivostok is capital, according to an announcement by the official news agency of the revolutionary Zensvo government here. Demand also will be made for the return of the steamers Orrel and Yakut.

Recent Vladivostok advices reported General Rozanoff with a number of Russian officers and their families had arrived in Tsuruga, Japan following the revolution at Vladivostok January 31.

W. OF W. MEETING SHOWS INCREASE IN INVESTMENTS

A meeting of unusual interest to the members of Medford camp Woodmen of the World was held last Wednesday evening, the annual roll call of members. The hall was well filled and nearly every member, who by reason of distance was unable to attend, wrote a letter, which was read to the neighbors.

According to reports read Medford camp has paid over \$23,000 to relatives of deceased members; the Woodmen of the World have over \$150,000 invested in Medford and Jackson county, and \$1,958,840 invested in Oregon in school and municipal bonds.

A committee reported the Halley property, corner Fifth and Grape, suited to the wants of the camp, and the committee was authorized to close the deal. A club and reading room will be maintained on the lower floor of the premises, with lodge rooms above.

District Manager Pitts paid Medford camp his first official visit on this occasion, and a campaign to put fifty new members into Medford camp was launched, with twelve applications on the clerk's desk.

Medford camp will visit Phoenix camp on the evening of March 8. As Phoenix camp is noted for its hospitality, an enjoyable time is anticipated.

RECORD PRODUCTION POTASH IN GERMANY

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28.—Production of potash in Germany last month reached the record total of 550,000 tons, an official dispatch received here today said. The greatly increased output was ascribed largely to improved industrial conditions and to the fact that a large number of returning prisoners of war have gone to work in this industry.

A project is under way, the dispatch said, to import antimony coal from the United States as this fuel is urgently needed in the potash industry.

PANAMA STRIKE TO BE SETTLED BY MEDIATION

PANAMA, Feb. 28.—Indications early today were that the strike of approximately 15,000 maintenance of way workers in the Panama canal zone was over for the time being at least. It was announced by British Minister Bennett that the leaders of the striking union members had accepted his offer to act as mediator between the men and Governor Harding of the canal zone, and that the men meantime had agreed to return to work at noon today. The great majority of the strikers are West Indians, largely from British possessions.

PANAMA, Friday, Feb. 27.—Unwillingness on the part of the Panamanian government to receive 1,000 striking maintenance of way workers from the canal zone is expected here to end the strike which began a few days ago.

Governor Harding of the canal zone was informed today that there was a possibility that the strikers would become public charges in future.

Men who are idle because of the strike, do not favorably contemplate repatriation to the West Indies. The British minister is attempting to bring about a settlement.

PORTLAND BUILT SHIPS PLACED IN ATLANTIC TRADE

PORTLAND, Feb. 28.—The question "what becomes of Oregon built ships after they leave here?" is answered by reports announced today by the Columbia-Pacific Shipping company on fifteen shipping boats steaming, which the local company is operating in other parts of the world. All of these vessels have been loaded here and dispatched to the Atlantic coast or United Kingdom with their initial cargoes and a large proportion of them, after discharging the cargoes loaded here, have been placed in the Atlantic-European tramp service.

Reports were received by cable in the office of the Columbia-Pacific company, telling of new assignments for four wooden ships under their operation. The steamer Capitan was reported to have been fixed for a voyage from the United Kingdom to Sorbenico, Austria.

The wooden steamer Blue Eagle, which carried ties from Portland to Cardiff, Wales, and sailed from there to West, France and from there to Antwerp, Belgium, was reported to have arrived at Trieste, Austria, February 25. The steamers Aspenhill and Kakiki, which carried railroad ties to the United Kingdom, were reported enroute respectively to Barry Roads, Wales, and Antwerp.

30,000 PEOPLE AT AUTO SHOW IN PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Feb. 28.—This was the final day of Portland's eleventh annual automobile show and of its first separate truck show. Both events will close at 11 o'clock tonight.

This year's automobile show has surpassed any previous auto event here in the number of cars shown, the variety of new models on display, beauty of the setting in which the show was held and in attendance. Final attendance figures, it was said, are certain to show a total of close to 30,000, which is an average of 5000 for each day.
