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REAL DRIVE FOR C. OF COMMERCE BEGINS MONDAY

No city can care for its immense organization problems without a Chamber of Commerce or a similar organization. It is a necessity. Serious-minded, patriotic men everywhere are giving public service thru their Chamber of Commerce, so that the least possible loss of time and money and the greatest efficiency may result from their efforts. It is a patriotic duty to many. Make it your duty—Vernon H. Vawter, president Medford Chamber of Commerce.

The Medford Chamber of Commerce's expansion and reorganization campaign is taking on more definite form each succeeding day, and at headquarters the preliminary details of the work are making satisfactory progress according to a statement made today by Campaign Secretary Jack C. Hodgson.

Director James B. Gheen authorized the statement today that he had requested a conference with the board of directors of the Chamber of Commerce for Monday for the purpose of selecting an advisory committee. The personnel of the advisory committee will be made up of representative and public-spirited citizens of Medford who are to serve as a consulting council in passing upon the different phases of the campaign which will develop as it progresses.

The advisory committee will be called together for its first meeting Tuesday at which time the order of business will be the naming of an executive committee whose duty it will be to act in a directing capacity with supervision over the actual campaign work.

Director Gheen will explain to the advisory committee at its meeting Tuesday the complete details of the campaign, and advise with them as to local needs and conditions. A full report will be made to the citizenship soon as to the committee's ideas and feeling on the matter.

Some emphasis was placed today on the statement that straight business-like methods will characterize the presentation to the public of the project for expanding and reorganizing the Chamber of Commerce. No red-fire or sensational methods will be followed, the appeal being solely on the ground that the proposed organization is a good thing and membership therein a wise investment of time and money.

The widest possible publicity will be given the campaign. It will be made plain that efficient organization and operation of a community service has been standardized thru hundreds of experiments and the best of these ideas will be adopted here.

Willingness to cooperate in the movement is already in evidence locally. These citizens have been impressed with the wish of government officials for such help as well organized communities can give them and in addition with the opportunity to bring about necessary betterments at home.

A form of application for membership in the Medford organization will be drafted soon, and it was said today that already a number of voluntary enlistments have been received. However, no effort will be made to enroll members for some time, it being thought best to preface this part of the campaign with a period of educational and instructive information about the project.

The entire plan of the campaign looks to permanence for the results. Medford's position commercially and industrially is important. Supporters of the new organization now seek to make its civic standing correspondingly high. For this reason, the invitation to enlist in the reorganized plan, will be as general as the citizenship itself.

Representatives of the American City Bureau in charge of the campaign here, who are also conducting the same sort of a campaign at Ashland, report keen interest and great activity in the interest of the project launched there by the Commercial club of that city. As the campaign progresses it is natural to assume that there will be marked friendly rivalry developed to see which city will put over the most successful results.

Campaign headquarters have been established at Ashland in the store-room at 29 North Main street where a clerical and stenographic force are at work on the preliminary details and the compilation of the prospect list.
