

APPOINT ADVISORY COMMITTEE TODAY C. OF COMMERCE

An advisory committee to act during the ensuing expansion and reorganization campaign of the Medford Chamber of Commerce is to be named this afternoon at 4:30 o'clock at a special meeting of the board of directors, called by President Vernon H. Vawter. This committee is to be thoroughly representative of all civic, commercial, industrial, agricultural and other interests of the city of Medford and immediate surrounding territory. Its first duty will be the election of an executive committee of six to have direct charge and supervision of the ensuing expansion and reorganization campaign of the Chamber of Commerce.

Immediately following the naming of the advisory committee, notification in writing will be mailed to each of the members, and they will be requested to attend a meeting Tuesday at which Campaign Director James E. Gheen will be present and explain the general outline of the campaign as contemplated at this time. Suggestions, however, will be invited and anything that may be deemed of importance to the city's new community service organization will be given due consideration.

"In the present campaign for new members now being conducted for the Chamber of Commerce by the American City Bureau going to end merely with the getting of new members and money, or is there going to be something more to it than that?"

What Is to Be Done
This question was also put to Mr. Gheen, to which he replied:

"Let us assume that the membership campaign is over and that the list of members has been increased to 400, each and every one agreeing to pay \$25 a year for three years into the treasury, and that the budget fund of \$10,000 has been subscribed, or \$20,000 all told, to be used for the civic and commercial betterment of Medford.

"Now comes the question of what is going to be done with all of this money. Certain expedients have been found expedient in expending funds of this kind. First of all it has been found that no small group of men like a board of directors, however brilliant, can determine (and be themselves what should be done to promote the greatest welfare of the community. Consequently instead of a board of directors for the Chamber

of Commerce endeavoring to lay out a plan for the expending of the funds of the organization, a question blank is sent to every member asking what he believes should be done. Each blank contains two questions, viz:

"First—What, in your opinion, is the thing of first importance that should be undertaken by the Chamber of Commerce to improve the trade conditions and opportunities in your own line of business?"

"Second—What, as a citizen, do you believe that the Chamber of Commerce should first undertake for the good of the city at large? And what help, in time, thought or money will you render towards that end?"

"Now it is invariably found that when the answers to these questions have been received, analyzed and tabulated, they group themselves, naturally under ten or fifteen headings. The bureau through one of its representatives will also address the high school students of the city, inviting similar suggestions from them as to what the Chamber of Commerce should do for the general up-lift and betterment of the city.

"There are two distinct advantages in the method of formulating a program of work. The first is that by this means the organization knows exactly what the membership at large desires to undertake. The second is that these answers develop a broad interest which, on the part of many members, has never before been generally shown, that these men who sometimes have been thought to lack interest in public affairs are shown to be keenly interested in some phase of the development of the community.

50 Per Cent Workers
"Consequently a large number of civily inclined citizens is developed by this plan and then when the officers come to appoint committees instead of merely appointing men whom they assume will work on the committees, they are able to place their fingers on men whom they practically know will carry out the suggestions they themselves have made on a particular subject.

"The result is that in the end we have a 50 per cent working organization where previously we had less than 10 per cent and the good accomplished by our commercial body is in like proportion."

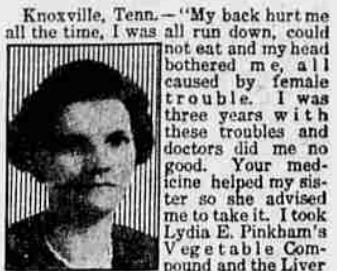

he was in the hall. He saw in the hall on the day of the shooting, Ray Becker, James McInerney, Britt Smith, John Davis, Ole Hanson, Wesley Everest and John Lamb.

Everest was the man lynched by a mob and Davis and Hanson are defendants who have not been apprehended. The others are among the ten defendants on trial. Sheehan ran to the rebox after the shooting began, he testified, and hid therein with Becker, McInerney and T. C. Morgan, a member of the I. W. W. at the time, but now a state's witness. A man in uniform, after the shooting, Sheehan testified, let them out when he secured a promise that none of the men in the box would shoot.

That efforts to protect the men arrested, from the violence of the angry citizens were made was testified to by Sheehan, who told how Policeman Jackson of Centralia struck a uniformed man who tried to take away his prisoners. Sheehan made a voluntary statement to prosecution attorneys, he said. He heard Britt Smith tell the chief of police that he wanted to make a statement, he said, so he, thinking Britt Smith wanted to "double-cross" him told the chief he too wished to make a statement. The statement was made in the office of C. B. Cunningham, special prosecutor, Sheehan said. The court rebuked Defense Counsel Vanderveer when the latter attempted to place in the record Sheehan's version of events following the shooting. Judge Wilson, presiding, told Vanderveer that he insisted that the trial be conducted in proper manner and that he should not attempt to argue before the jury questions not admissible.

Sheehan testified he did not have a gun on the day of the shooting, although he said Davis had asked him

if he had one. He said he bore no malice against the men who paraded. He had worked at Camp Lewis with soldiers, he said.

On cross-examination Sheehan named the defendants he had seen in the hall the day of the shooting. He did not see either Bert or O. C. Band, he said. He never saw Roberts until arraignment at Chelatis, he testified, nor did he see Elmer Smith until that time. Sheehan joined the I. W. W. in 1911, quit it in 1914 and joined again in 1917, he testified. He was not acquainted in Centralia, having gone there from McCormick. The only discussion he heard in the I. W. W. hall the night before the shooting, he said, was that of the Irish question.
