EUROPE IN DANGER LOSING POSITION HELD BEFORE WAR

LONDON, Mar. 4.—Europe is in danger of permanently losing the position she held in the world before the outbreak of the world war, says Premier Nitti of Italy in an interview printed by the Manchester Guardian today. He points out that Europe is no longer a creditor but is on the debit side of the ledger.

Public order in Italy is good, he says, and if that country could get her minimum requirements in coal, foodstuffs and raw materials she would be able to reconstitute herself economically.

Only brief allusion to the Adriatic problem is made in the interview. "We shall find a way out," says the premier, "and we and the Jugoslavs will be friends. Don't magnify this frontier controversy by talking of imperialism. * * * Feeling naturally exists over Fiume, because the future of some Italians is immediately concerned. * * * What after all is Italy demanding in the Adriatic? She wants strips of territory, the population of which is less than the Italian casualties in the war."

Premier Nitti expresses strong conviction in favor of restoring normal relations with Russia, adding: "There should be no more meddling with the internal affairs of one country by another."

GERMANY MAKES BIG SALE TO AMERICA

BERLIN, Mar. 3.—American orders amounting to \$50,000,000 have been booked by the Potash Syndicate, says the Vossische Zeitung, which declares deliveries will be extended over a number of years.

WILL LAUNCH CLUB DRIVE.

Production is improving and the syndicate hopes to be able to devote the greater part of its output to the American export trade.

Director Gheen has emphasized the fact that the more workers there are in the field the larger number of enrollments will result and the individual labor necessary will be minimized. At the luncheon yesterday Mr. Gheen explained to those present that the prospect cards that have been listed at headquarters total approximately 800. From this list the field teams will be expected to enroll the quota of at least 400 members who will sign up for three years at the rate of \$25 a year. This number of members at \$25 each will give an annual revenue of \$10,000 from membership dues, and in addition a working fund or budget of \$10,000 will be raised by subscriptions from local manufacturers, industries, financial concerns, stores and individuals whose investments here are largest and who will therefore contribute proportionately to the local community organization.

At the civic dinner the team captains will draw lots to determine their respective territory for canvassing. The prospect cards will be arranged into ten districts, and each team will work a district. The cards will contain the names and addresses of each of the prospects, and Director Gheen is quite positive that the canvass will be completed within the prescribed time limit of four days; in fact, he said that three days might prove all that is necessary. The team workers will report at headquarters each morning at 10 o'clock for instructions, after which they will go out and cover their allotted districts, and report back at noon at a stated place where luncheon will be served and the results of the different teams activities bulletined from day to day.
