

5 REGIMENTS TO BE STATIONED IN STATE OF OREGON

According to a telegram from Major General P. C. Harris, adjutant general of the army, the number of recruits wanted for the army in the United States before March 31 is 75,000. The Oregon district is expected to furnish 743 of this number.

Recruiting officers were instructed as follows: "In this campaign, we the citizens of the nation, who are either permanently or temporarily in its military service, should drive home to our civilian associates in that citizenship, the system of military, educational, vocational and recreational training offered by the army to all desiring and qualified to undergo it. It is imperative, therefore, that civilian communities, organizations, and individuals be made to realize absolutely not only the initial and individual benefit to the man himself but also the lasting benefit to the nation and to the community to which he returns upon discharge."

Permanent plans for the localization of regiments for recruiting purposes are now under consideration but cannot be completed until congress, by legislation, fixes the size and character of the permanent army. Meantime, in order that men from the same section may, if they desire, be associated together and that each state may have an established point of contact with the army, each regiment in the United States has been allocated to a state or group of states so that the authorized strength of these regiments may be completed from the states to which assigned.

The regiments allocated to Oregon are the 35th infantry, 78th field artillery, 57th coast artillery, 8th engineers, and 15th cavalry. Oregon men are invited to enlist in these regiments, but are not required to do so. If they choose, they may enlist for any branch of the army, and may usually obtain special assignments in the part of the country that most appeals to them.

RIVERSIDE, Cal., Mar. 4.—Lieutenant Raymond E. Pearson, a United States army aviator, was killed today at March Field, near here, when his airplane went into a tail spin too near the ground to recover. Lieutenant Pearson had been flying here five or six months.

AMERICAN CITY BUREAU IS GIVEN HIGH ENDORSEMENT

The naming of three committees—membership, budget and wording—will be considered by the chamber of commerce campaign's executive committee at a meeting called for 7:30 o'clock tonight at campaign headquarters, corner Main and Front streets. This committee is composed of Harry L. Walther, chairman; A. L. Hill, C. M. Kidd, H. C. Garnett, Mrs. C. L. Schlettlin and Mrs. Jap Andrews. The two majors to direct ten captains of field teams during the membership drive will also be named this evening by the executive committee.

Officials of the chamber of commerce thinking the information may be of general interest to the public of Medford, today made public a number of telegrams they have received from chambers of commerce in fifteen different cities. These telegrams were received in reply to other wires sent by the chamber body requesting information regarding the American City Bureau's success in conducting membership campaigns elsewhere. Each reply proved entirely satisfactory to the Medford board of directors and they promptly contracted with the bureau for its service. Appended are copies of several of the telegrams referred to above:

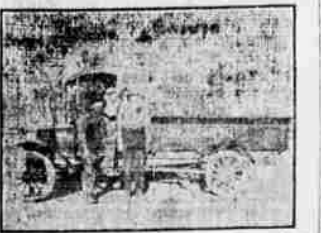
