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WHY MR. WILSON FAILED

A MUCH DISCUSSED book at present is "Economic Consequences of the Peace" by Maynard Keynes, representative of the British Treasury at the Paris peace conference.

Mr. Keynes is an economic expert of international standing, and as his book shows, a man of keen psychological insight and high literary gifts.

This extract dwells upon the cause of the President's procedure. We quote as follows:

Compromise was inevitable, and never to compromise on the essential, very difficult. Besides he was soon made to appear to be taking the German part and laid himself open to the suggestion to which he foolishly and unfortunately consented of being "pro-German."

After a display of much principle and dignity in the early days of the council of ten, he discovered that there were certain very important points in the program of his French, British or Italian colleagues, as the case might be, of which he was incapable of securing the surrender by the methods of secret diplomacy.

Therein, it seems to us, will lie the judgment of history upon the President's course at Paris. His fatal mistake was not made at Paris, it was made at home.

But once in Paris, alone, without his own country united behind him—as a representative commission would have united it.—President Wilson, it seems to us, adopted the only course that lay open to him.
