

J. H. FULLER TO BE LEADER ASHLAND CLUB CAMPAIGN

ASHLAND, Mar. 5.—J. H. Fuller is permanent chairman of the executive committee directing the municipal campaign here as outlined by the American City Bureau, and his efforts will receive the cooperation of E. V. Carter, Rev. C. A. Edwards, Supt. G. A. Briscoe, Prof. Irving Vining and V. O. N. Smith. The advisory committee of 25, heretofore appointed, made the selection of this committee, all keen and alert business and professional men.

The commercial club's expansion program implies that every person assuming active membership in the organization will be entitled to equal voting privileges with the membership in general in conducting its affairs. Sooner or later the present management of the club will practically retire, nominally at least, the re-elections to position may and doubtless will occur.

The major aim, in a financial way, is steadfastly kept in view, the object being to enroll 300 members in the club's organization, who will be pledged to contribute an annual membership fee of \$25 each for three years, that being the period implied as the length of time the American City Bureau will conduct operations here, either directly, for a stipulated time, or indirectly in an advisory capacity, even should its active agents be not personally in the local field during this entire period. The \$7500 will be matched on a 50-50 basis by a working fund of \$7500 additional, to be raised by subscription from those who will derive more direct benefits from specific activities which are to be developed.

The field staff of the American City Bureau has been reinforced here by Robert Leopold, former secretary of the chamber of commerce at Athens, Ohio. Director Gheen, in line with a policy of the bureau to interest and secure the aid of every possible influence in behalf of ideal municipal government, addressed the pupils of the high school on Thursday morning. A big civic conference will be held at headquarters on Monday night, March 8, when field teams for active duty will be named. This demand involves labors for two hours during four days, beginning March 16, following a civic meeting the day previous. The town will be divided into ten districts in order to expedite the canvass, and provided 600 respond to the invitation to engage in the work as outlined in a prospect card schedule, this arrangement will imply that each canvasser will be called upon to solicit only ten persons in behalf of the expansion project to secure the required memberships.

Recognizing the benefits to be derived thru co-operation of the clergy as well as the laity in the campaign, "Civic Sunday," to be observed Mar. 14, has been suggested by Director Gheen as a date when the ministers of Ashland, at the morning service, will be asked to dwell upon the topic of civic righteousness as a text, defining the duty of churchmen to their community.
