MAY INITIATE A BILL FOR DIVIDED SESSION AT SALEM
PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 10.—The state taxpayers league contemplates the initiation of a constitutional amendment for a divided session of the legislature. Provisions of the amendment which were agreed upon at a meeting of the executive committee last night call for an opening period of forty days to convene, as at present, on the first Monday in January.

At this session bill would be introduced to committees, committee reports would be adopted and everything prepared for the final passage of the bill, but nothing except certain appropriation bills would be finally passed at the first period. At the second period, which would convene on the third Monday in April, bills would be finally passed. No amendment could be made except by four-fifths majority of both houses of the legislature. No new bill could be introduced at the second period.

The initiators of the amendment declare that it would go a long way toward ending the rush of the closing hours of the sessions when bills are usually put through without full consideration by the members and with no notice to the public. There would be no change made in the rate of compensation for the members of the legislature, but they would be compensated for their mileage to both sessions.

Friends of the proposed amendment argue that during the sixty days they have full opportunity of studying all legislation which might be before the legislature.

HAWLEY GETS BABY AND HIS DIVORCE
PORTLAND, Mar. 10.—(Special to Mail Tribune.) Mr. Hawley was given the decision in his divorce proceedings at Oregon City today and the care and custody of the child. The case attracted widespread attention because of the prominence of the couple and the sensational developments at the trial.

STERLING EXCHANGE COMES UP AGAIN
NEW YORK, Mar. 10.—Considerable strength was shown in sterling exchange today, demand bills closing at the rate of \$3.76, a net gain of 12 1/2c over yesterday's final figures. Franc checks were quoted at the rate of 13.20 for the American dollar, up 52 centimes, and lire checks were quoted at the rate of 17.52, an advance of 45 centimes. German marks sold for 1.62 cents each, the highest rate in several weeks.

CROWN PRINCE GETTING READY FOR TROUBLE, IS NOW MISTER UPPERCUT
WIESENEN, Mar. 10.—Friedrich Wilhelm, former German crown prince, is now a "pretty good scraper," says W. LaCroix, a Dutch lightweight who for the past four months has been giving Wilhelm lessons. "The former crown prince's favorite blow is an uppercut," LaCroix told an Associated Press correspondent, "and he is learning how to use it."

AIRPLANE MAIL MAN BURNED IN MACHINE
ELKHART, Ind., Mar. 10.—A government airplane mail carrier, identified by marks on his clothing as Lieutenant Clayton Stoner of Chicago, was burned to death in his airplane when it fell near New Paris, Ind., about 10 p. m. today. Stoner probably became lost in the mist and was seeking the Wabash railroad, which the mail carriers follow daily in their flight over this section of the country.

LONDON, Mar. 10.—John W. Davis, the American ambassador, declined to comment today on the action of the West Virginia democratic state committee in endorsing him for the democratic nomination for president. The ambassador said he had not yet received the message which Parkersburg, W. Va., dispatches announced had been sent to him by the committee to ascertain his attitude relative to entering the race.

DETECTIVE AGED 3 CAPTURES BURGLAR
NEW YORK, Mar. 10.—Charles Reynolds, Jr., aged three, was the detective that "busted off" his father, a New York policeman, that a man was trying to break into an apartment and caused the burglar's arrest. Within the family circle Charley had heard that men who tampered with locks were not supposed to be allowed the freedom of the city, so when he and his father were visiting his grandparents, he took a stroll through the hallways of the apartment house. He saw a young man tampering with a lock and concluded the matter would interest his father. Charley and his father overpowered the burglar.

GODWARD CANDIDATE FOR CO. SCHOOL SUPT.
G. W. Godward, who has announced himself as a republican candidate for the nomination for superintendent of schools, has taught in Oregon for fifteen years, four years of that time in the Jacksonville schools, the last three as principal, and the balance in Yamhill, Columbia and Marion counties. He is a popular educator, believes that the time has come when it is necessary to pay better wages to all teachers in order to secure the efficient service, and has for his campaign slogan, "Efficient service and a square deal."

Influenza in Alaska.
SEATTLE, Mar. 10.—Influenza has appeared among the scores of Alaskans who stampeded to the Ketchikan, Alaska, oil fields when President Wilson signed the oil land leasing bill recently, according to reports received by the United States health officials here.
