SALEM, Ore., Mar. 11.—Petitions prepared by the commercial club, began circulation here today, calling for a special election to create a port of Salem. According to the tentative plans of the club a three-story dock and warehouse, costing about \$200,000, will be erected on the waterfront if the district votes to bond itself.

**Blossom Day at Salem.**  
SALEM, Ore., Mar. 11.—Under plans prepared by the commercial club, Salem will institute a "blossom day" some time between April 5 and 15, when tree blossoming in and around the city is at its height.

**Roseburg Woman Killed.**  
ROSEBURG, Ore., Mar. 11.—Ada Roberts, daughter of Edward Roberts, an employe of the Glendale Lumber company, was accidentally killed at Fernvale, it was learned today, when a heavy lumber truck on which she and other children were riding, collided with a logging train.

**Mountaineer Found Dead.**  
ROSEBURG, Ore., Mar. 11.—John Bookman, a mountaineer, living in a lone cabin in the Camas valley mountains, 25 miles west of here, was found dead in his bed by neighbors, it became known today. Bookman had lived here for 25 years and is reported to have wealthy relatives in Chicago. He was born in Switzerland and was naturalized in Roseburg. He had been dead for several weeks.

### ALLIES TO DEMAND GERMAN PENALTIES

PARIS, Mar. 11.—The conference of ambassadors today decided to send the German government a very firm worded note demanding immediate application of the penalties provided for the atrocities suffered by officers of the inter-allied commission to the Baltic states during the German evacuation of this region which has hitherto been delayed.

The conference decided to demand again that the government at Belgrade order the evacuation of Radkersburg, which is still occupied by the Jugo-Slavs contrary to the provisions of the conference.

### AMERICA BLAMED FOR TURKEY MESS

LONDON, Mar. 11.—Blame for the troubles that are being experienced in settling the Turkish problem, were laid at the door of the United States by Earl Curzon, the foreign secretary, in explaining the peace conference's negotiations to the house of lords today.

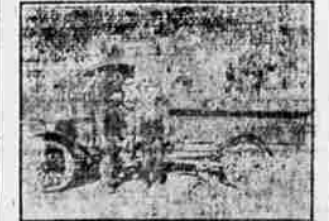

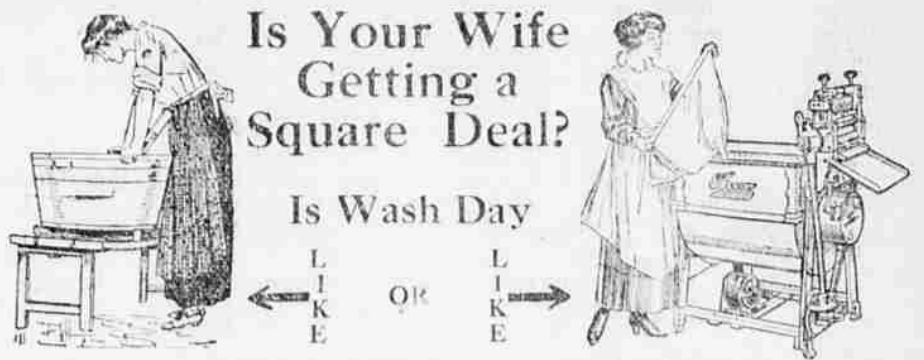
