SENATE ORDERS AN INVESTIGATION OF U. S. GRAIN BOARD

WASHINGTON, Mar. 11.—An investigation of the United States grain corporation was ordered today by the senate.

Senator Reed's resolution proposing the inquiry came as a result of the recent federal grand jury at Spokane Wash., was adopted after much discussion.

The investigation will be made by the senate manufactures committee. The committee, of which Senator LaFollette, republican, Wisconsin, is chairman, will inquire into the reported wheat pool as well as the "dealings, operations, speculations and manipulations if any there have been" of the corporation or its officials.

During the debate Senator Ashurst, Arizona, charged that the resolution was directed primarily at Herbert Hoover and that it was a "heart of a policy that is being pursued to throw mud upon men who rendered valuable services during the war."

A letter from Max H. Houser, the corporation official named in the grand jury report, was presented by Senator Chamberlain, democrat, Oregon. It urged a complete investigation of the charges.

WISCONSIN DELEGATES FOR LAFOLLETTE WILL OPPOSE THE COVENANT

MADISON, Wis., Mar. 11.—

Freedom of speech and press, the defeat of the treaty of peace and of the League of Nations, the repeal of the espionage law, are some of the provisions in the platform of the "LaFollette progressive republican delegates," candidates to the national convention, issued today. There are two sets of Wisconsin republican delegate candidates for the national republican convention in the primaries here April 6. One delegation is "un-instructed" and the other is running under the label "LaFollette progressive republican."

The platform is opposed to "compulsory military service in time of peace," is for the "abolition of injunctions in labor disputes," demands economy in government and condemns recent extravagance, favors soldier bonus payment by the federal government and is for the great Lakes deep waterway plan.

Benson, then chief of naval operations.

Admiral Benson himself visited London early in November, Admiral Sims continued, and quickly convinced himself of the wisdom of sending over the coal burning battleships. He communicated with the department and received a reply that the New York, Florida, Delaware and Wyoming would be ready to sail "after docking."

Admiral Sims said this squadron represented four different types of ships.

"It would have been just as easy," he said, "to have selected a homogeneous squadron. The reason it was not done was that they (other ships of the same type) were not ready for service at sea."

OREGON CITY, Ore., Mar. 11.—Effective March 16, the Hawley Pulp and Paper company and the Crown Willamette Paper company announce increases in wages that will affect 2,000 men and add approximately \$225,000 annually to the payrolls of the companies.

the general welfare of the city be present.

Local and out of town speakers familiar with civic-commercial organization work will make addresses. Community singing from especially prepared song sheets for this campaign will feature the attractiveness of the program which is now in course of preparation. The details will be announced thru the local press, later.

The statement was made at headquarters today, in announcing this meeting, that while invitations have been sent to those men and women whose names are available from the "prospect list" that is being compiled at campaign headquarters, it is the earnest desire that the invitation thru the press be considered as general, as every one interested in the betterment and upbuilding of Medford will be welcomed.

Director James E. Gheen, at the luncheon held yesterday at the Hotel Medford, and attended by more than 60 of Medford's representative citizens, intensified the enthusiasm of those present with the declaration that so far as any of the members of the American City Bureau staff in Medford can remember, this city has established a new bureau record in having signed up workers cards twelve days before the actual intensive enrollment campaign begins. The original plan was to have a total of 80 field men to make the canvass of the city for members during the four days beginning Tuesday, March 23, but Mr. Gheen has explained that the more workers in the field the greater number of members will be signed, and the general work incident to the canvass will be minimized.

The plan as it stands at present is to name two majors and ten captains who will have teams of seven men each under their direction. The prospect cards will be arranged by districts, the city being divided into ten parts. The two majors who have been named by the executive committee are to be Ben C. Sheldon and W. Gaston Domergue; both have accepted the appointment. Of the ten captains designated, acceptances thus far have been received from seven: John Goodrich, S. I. Brown, G. M. Roberts, J. H. Carlin, W. E. Walker, E. M. McKeaney and N. A. Loucks.

The program of work for the field teams provides for two hours during the forenoon of March 23, 24, 25 and 26. Mr. Gheen says that some teams have been known to complete their districts in a single day during other campaigns conducted by the bureau.

President Vawter of the Chamber of Commerce is desirous that more men, women, boys and girls send in suggestions for an appropriate slogan for Medford. The Chamber of Commerce, as previously announced, has been joined by the American City Bureau in offering a cash prize of \$25 for the suggestion that is accepted. The original slogan committee composed of John Tomlin, Dr. E. G. Riddell and H. S. Denel, has been increased to five members, Leonard Carpenter and Roy L. Myron Booser being added. This committee will announce its decision at the civic dinner on the evening of Monday, March 23.
