

MAYOR GATES TO OPEN PROGRAM AT COMMUNITY MEET

IN DOUBT? ASK C. C.

A travel-stained individual lugging two heavy grips called at Chamber of Commerce campaign headquarters last night a few minutes after arrival of No. 16, northbound train, and asked to see the city directory.

"Do you desire to find someone that lives here?" queried Campaign Secretary Jack C. Hodgson.

"Yes, I certainly do; and I don't know how I'm going to go about it," came the trouble reply.

"Cease worrying, Brother," quoth Hodgson; "What's his name; I'll tell you where he resides."

The caller gave the name of the man whom he sought.

Hodgson went to his "prospective list" that has been compiled for the benefit of field men who will conduct the drive for new members during the week of March 22.

"Here's your man, and he lives at this address," said Hodgson writing the information on a slip of paper.

Incidentally, if there's a family in Medford whose address is not listed for the campaigners, Hodgson would like to know it.

The details of the program for the community conference to be held at the Page theatre, Tuesday evening, March 16, were made public at chamber of commerce reorganization campaign headquarters today. That the conference will be a meeting of unusual interest, and one of more than ordinary importance to the future welfare and up-building of Medford, is the assurance of every member of the board of directors as well as all the campaign officials.

The program will be featured by community singing for which a song sheet has been especially prepared. An orchestra has been engaged for the evening, and the singing will begin at 7:30 o'clock. The songs to be sung are familiar patriotic selections, and popular airs to which words with local significance have been applied.

Mayor C. E. Gates will deliver the opening address in which he will deal in a general way with the needs of Medford, and the assistance a strong civic-commercial body may be expected to render the entire community. This talk by the mayor will be followed by an address by Jake Allen, former managing director of the Vinalia board of trade. Mr. Allen served during the great war as a chaplain and received the distinguished Service Cross for extreme valor under fire. His theme will be community service. Another address will be made by Director James E. Gheen in charge of the Medford chamber of commerce campaign, who will tell of the progress that is being made up to this time.

The especially prepared song sheets for the community conference will be distributed among the audience by the ushers.

Fifteen hundred invitations to this meeting have been mailed out from campaign headquarters to men and women of the city. However, the meeting is open to the public and all interested in the welfare of Medford will be welcome to attend. There is a possibility that some who should have received invitations may unintentionally have been overlooked, hence this general invitation.

Officers Appointed

That Medford is showing great interest in the expansion and reorganization campaign of the chamber of commerce is indicated by the statement given out at headquarters today that the field organization which is to conduct the intensive campaign for new members during the week of March 22, has been completed so far as the appointment and acceptance of majors and captains are concerned, almost a full week in advance of the time usually allotted to this important work by the American City Bureau.

The field organization will be commanded by two majors, Ben C. Shelton and W. Gaston Domergue.

PROCLAMATION

We believe Medford needs a strong central civic-commercial organization which can be the clearing house for the best thought of its citizens in matters that affect the civic, commercial, educational, tourist, industrial and agricultural welfare of the community. We believe the time is at hand when such an organization should be founded with maximum numerical and financial strength to enable it to properly assist in solving the many present and future problems with which Medford is, and will be, faced.

The decision to reorganize the Chamber of Commerce was made only after careful consideration. The experience of hundreds of American cities with organizations planned along the lines to be adopted here have been presented by the American City Bureau and we feel confident of the success of the undertaking.

Following the membership campaign, new by-laws will be adopted and an election held to select the directors of the organization. In this election, the directors will be chosen by popular vote of the entire membership, every member having an equal voice in the nomination and election under a secret primary system. The choice of officers will follow immediately.

Under the plan adopted, membership dues will be \$25 per year, pledged for three years. Payments may be made quarterly, semi-annually or annually.

The income from membership dues will be reserved for the expenses of maintaining the organization; that is for the payment of salaries of the secretary and general administration staff, office rent, office expenses, committee expenses, meetings, speakers and incidentals directly connected with the general activities of the membership.

The special working fund or budget to be raised during the campaign by subscription from industries, financial institutions, hotels, stores and individuals is to be used in carrying out the program of work of the new chamber. This program of work is built up from written suggestions received from the entire membership and represents the best thinking of the community.

Coincident with the making of this program of work during the installation of the new organization, a thoroughly modern system of committee operation and control will be put into effect, and in all ways, the new chamber will be conducted along the most approved lines of action and progress. Absolute democracy will at all times prevail.

Medford is your home as it is ours. Jointly, we can make the Chamber of Commerce an incalculable power in the city's upbuilding.

Medford's prosperity can be advanced and made permanent, her loyalty further proved, and she can be placed in the forefront of western cities—modern in attainments and community that,—an ideal city.

We ask you to join hands with us in this progressive movement for a Greater Medford.
