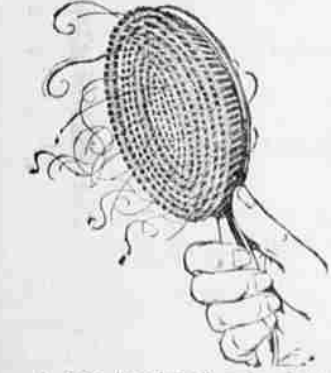
As far as anybody knows, none of the democratic candidates for the presidency have announced that they favor a continuation of the present administration policies.
