PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 16.—The Association of Fathers of Soldiers and Sailors last night adopted a resolution warning ex-service men not to come west for the purpose of settling on the lands opened for settlement within the Oregon and California grant.

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Mar. 14.—Indians of the allied tribes on the Klamath reservation are seeking to influence representatives in congress to obtain passage of legislation authorizing a government loan of \$2,000,000 redeemable from proceeds of sales of Indian timber.

BEND, Ore., Mar. 16.—Physicians attending C. E. Bagley, whose life was nearly ended here Saturday by an attack of hemorrhoids lasting over four days, today pronounced him out of danger unless there is a recurrence of the unusual malady.

SALEM, Ore., Mar. 15.—By a decision of the Oregon supreme court today, Harry West, a prominent western Oregon stockman, was awarded \$625 damages from Marion county because of injuries received by himself and damages to his automobile, when he ran off an embankment near Gervais.

PORTLAND, Mar. 16.—A jam of three million feet of logs in the Cowitz river at Rocky Point, three miles above Kefau, Wash., caused an advance of one-half cent per pound in the price of smelt in the Portland market today.

Admiral Sims said he particularly wished to refute an assertion widely circulated, that the department had proposed and from the first favored the mine barrage project and that he was "about the only officer in the navy who had ever opposed it."

The money was taken in by the office last night during the last minute income tax rush. R. E. Stafford, cashier of the office, came to work at 7:15 this morning. He opened the vault and sat down at his desk. A few minutes later he heard the sound of "hands up" and, looking around, saw two masked men covering him with revolvers.

The robbers backed Stafford into the vault and filled their pockets with packages of bills. The two then backed out of the safe, dashed through a hall door and escaped.

MARK STEELHEAD TO DETERMINE MIGRATING SPEED

The fish and game commission expects to co-operate with the U. S. bureau of fisheries in determining the migratory speed of the steelhead from the lower Rogue river to the upper reaches in Josephine and Jackson counties.

This is just a portion of the information the fish and game commission will set together, according to Mr. Shoemaker. It will also ascertain through anglers and commercial fishermen the time at which the salmon and steelhead ascend in the Rogue at different points of the water stages, in order that efforts may be made to work out a solution of the Rogue river controversy.
