SALVATION ARMY DRIVE IN OREGON IS FOR \$244,000

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 18.—County Advisory Board members in convention yesterday at the call of the State Advisory Board of the Salvation Army Home Service Program for 1920, enthusiastically endorsed a plan presented by the state board to raise \$244,000 in Oregon for the extension of salvation army service to remote districts. So heartily were the delegates in accordance with the plan that they added to this budget approximately \$40,000 to purchase and reopen the Bishop Scott school and 100-acre farm near Yamhill in Yamhill county for a Salvation Army industrial home and agricultural school in which to take care of minor cases of juvenile delinquency and orphans.

A hundred delegates heard Mrs. Commissioner Estill of Chicago explain the Salvation Army work among the women and Dr. Charles T. Wheeler tell of the work on the battle fields.

John L. Etheridge was chosen to handle the financial campaign and his organization, which will be built throughout the state, will be endorsed backed and aided by advisory boards of every county. Representatives of every county board present went out to White Shield Home, which is being taken over by the Salvation Army as its rescue home.

The budget endorsed by the county advisory boards is to be raised half in Multnomah county and half in outside counties.

der command of spartacist leaders are marching on that city. As the Ebert troops have not as yet resumed full control, an attack by the reds is feared.

Radicals Are Active

Thruout Germany radical elements have in many places taken over direction of affairs at least temporarily.

Proletarian dictatorships have been set up at Dortmund, Gera, Halle, Orliga, Unna and Gelsenkirchen, according to reports, while in Leipzig workers have driven government troops from the suburbs of the city and were engaged late yesterday in street fighting. In the Rhenish and Westphalian industrial districts it is said the workers are ready to follow radical leaders.

GENEVA, Mar. 18.—Former Emperor Charles of Austria, who is now making his home at Prangins, is reported to have been evidently pleased when he first received word of the reactionary revolt in Berlin. He refuses to express any opinion, however, but is closely following developments and is receiving many telegrams and letters every day.

Former Empress Zita is also in constant communication with Vienna, and has received a large number of visitors during the last few days. She is reported to be in better spirits than she has been for some time.

Assembly Meets Today

COPENHAGEN, Mar. 17.—The first plenary sitting of the German national assembly will be held Thursday afternoon at Stuttgart, according to a dispatch from that city tonight. Party leaders held long conferences yesterday afternoon.

The Bauer cabinet has insisted that troops engaged in the attack on the government be placed under the command of a general who was not involved in the revolt. Immediate abolition of the Iron division, made up of troops formerly in the Baltic regions who were involved in the occupation of Berlin Saturday morning has been demanded and the disbandment of the naval brigade which also had a part in Saturday's disorders will be insisted upon.

Warsaw Worried

WARSAW, Mar. 14.—Dispatches relative to the Berlin revolt are featured in newspapers here and there is much speculation regarding the effect of the upheaval upon the settlement of the upper Silesian question. It is reported that German residents of upper Silesia are openly expressing hope the Kapp government will succeed and repudiate the peace treaty.
