ASHLAND TO HAVE ENLARGED POST OFFICE BUILDING

ASHLAND, Mar. 19.—With the releasing by the Masonic lodge of present postoffice quarters to the government, it follows that a considerable lot of new equipment will be installed. The lease is supposed to run for ten years from March 1, 1929. Not only new equipment will be added, but there will be marked changes in the lobby and office, the former to be somewhat enlarged, thus necessitating changes in the entrance, which will be from the north side of the present doorway instead of in the center as at present, inasmuch as the office will be enlarged to an extent which will encroach upon the entrance as now located. Among a number of additions, the new equipment contract implies the installation of general delivery letter and general delivery paper cases, the former containing 80, and the latter 26 divisions; also a combination letter and paper case, wire back, containing 30 divisions; a spacious safe; a cash and stamp cabinet; also rural carriers' desk, a standing desk of ample proportions, and a revolving top desk. All these, together with wardrobe and other general furnishings, will make the office equipment in keeping with requirements and up-to-date service.

There have recently been many changes in the personnel of the office force, with a few new additions and the shifting of some others as to their departmental work, all the parties involved being ex-service men. Elbert Farlow is now one of the carriers and Hubert Bentley a regular clerk. Lieut. Don Spencer has been transferred from the carrier service to a clerkship. Nominally assistant postmaster for sometime past, Capt. Millard Grubb has recently had his position as such officially confirmed by the government. In length of service as clerk, Miss Lydia McCall leads the force. W. E. Moor is the "pioneer" carrier within city limits, while J. H. Doran still travels the pathways of the rural districts, rain or shine, both in and out of season. Charley Hargadine, the old reliable superintendent of transportation of mails between the postoffice and depot, is still on the job night and day, his status however being more of a railroad employe than that of the post office department.

Not only are new furnishings being added to the office, but in a general way all the equipment heretofore on hand is to be overhauled, some to be eliminated, while the residue is to be repaired and readjusted along lines which suggest "the survival of the fittest."

STORM IN MIDDLE WEST

In the twin cities electric light and power wires were crippled. Street cars were moving with difficulty. Telephone service between St. Paul and Minneapolis was very irregular. Telegraph and long distance telephone communication in all directions was crippled.

The storm was accompanied by high winds during the night which, however, had diminished somewhat by morning. The temperature held around thirty-two above zero.

Trans-continental trains on the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul road were being diverted to the Northern Pacific between Minneapolis and Terry, Mont., on account of snow blockades on the former road west of Aberdeen, S. D. Train service in the latter has been tied up for two days by heavy snow in Montana and South Dakota.

Crops Are Damaged

LINCOLN, Neb., Mar. 19.—High winds in Nebraska for several days reached a maximum velocity of 45 miles an hour last night and may result in some damage to the state's winter wheat crop the weather bureau reported today.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Mar. 19.—High winds continued to prevail today over the greater part of Kansas, where, according to reports received here, they have caused considerable damage to the growing wheat crop. In addition to crop damage wire communication is impaired at many places.

The winds have swept up volumes of dust from the freshly plowed fields.

Kansas apparently was receiving the brunt of the high winds, although the dust storm area embraces the greater part of the southwest.

CHEHALIS H. SCHOOL STRIKE A FAILURE

TACOMA, Mar. 19.—Twelve of the 62 students who renewed their strike in the high school at Chehalis returned to their lessons today after making apologies. The 50 who are still out have lost all status as scholars, school officials declare, and are suspended. Many of the young men were said to be seeking work today and will quit school for good. They include most of the athletes of the school. The school opera will not be given and some other student activities will be suspended for the remainder of the year as the result of the unauthorized dance in a school room, the faculty announced today.

WOOD AND JOHNSON FACTIONS SPLIT

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Mar. 19.—The tenth district republican convention here this afternoon after a turbulent factional fight broke into two conventions. One faction, favorable to the candidacy of Senator Hiram

Johnson, elected Congressman Thomas D. Schall and L. M. Mithun of Buffalo, as uninducted delegates to the national convention, whereupon the delegates supporting Leonard Wood withdrew and formed a separate temporary organization.

ed. More bloodshed occurred near the parliament buildings while in Charlottenburg and other suburbs clashes resulted in loss of life.

While radical elements have not made organized attacks on the capital economic conditions are described as serious. The resumption of power

by the constitutional government is opposed by those who believe it bargained with the reactionary leaders who tried to seize control and there seems to be an urgent demand for a re-organization of the ministry and changes in policy in important particulars.

Reports from Germany outside of Berlin are of such a character that a clear view of the situation is hard to obtain at present. While it is said soviets have been formed in a number of important towns and cities and in industrial districts, it does not appear the movement is gaining momentum.

Communist sympathizers seem to have met with stern opposition at many points.
