DIVERSIFIED FARMING MUST BE INTRODUCED INTO ROGUE RIVER VALLEY SAYS LEWIS

More and more it is becoming evident that the future development of the horticulture of the Pacific Northwest must go hand in hand with the development of the horticultural products business. Commercial enterprises, such as canneries, evaporators, and smaller plants, to be successful, must operate through a large market, and have a varied produce. Diversification then is the real life of the horticultural products business. A trip to such a city as San Jose, California, which now does \$50,000,000 worth of business in horticulture annually, shows conclusively that it is only through varied crops that such a business can be developed. The present development of the Rogue River valley in our own state, and the Yakima district in Washington, is showing us close at home the value of planting varied crops.

The Rogue River valley in the past has confined its energies almost entirely to the growing of apples and pears. Yet the valley is wonderfully adapted for many other horticultural crops. Strawberries, for example, will do very well, even certain types of soil known as "desert" when properly irrigated, will grow good berries. For the by-products trade varieties desirable are the Wilson, Effersburg, J21, and Treda. These are all smooth berries, of medium size, uniform shape, with a red flesh and juice. Most of them are heavy yielders, are good keepers, and especially well adapted for canning, shipping in barrels and for jam manufacture.

The raspberry offers one of the best opportunities for the valley. There seems to be almost no limit to the demand for raspberries. The red raspberry, such as the Guthbert, will do very well on the alluvial soils of the valley. Black ones, such as the Munger, Plum Former, and American, are all being eagerly sought by canners. Blackberries have always done well in the valley, and a limited tonnage of these will always meet with good demand. With the introduction of more irrigation, Logan berries can be grown to better advantage and an additional acreage of this fruit would be very desirable if a large canning business is to be developed in the valley.

Fourteen years ago, the Rogue River valley produced quite a few apricots. In sections as at the foot of Ross Ann, by Wagner Creek, along the bench from Jacksonville to Central Point, up Sam's Valley and similar sections, apricots grow very well. There was no market for them at that time and the valley gradually went out of the apricot business. Meanwhile, the demand for apricots has become stabilized. It is a demand which is hard to fill. The valley should grow a large tonnage of apricots, for the canning trade. Varieties with golden colored flesh are superior.

Italian prunes will also be used in the canneries. In fact, there is an indication at present that the canning demand may be superior to the fresh demand. Such tree soils as one finds in the portion of the area between Medford and Jacksonville are splendidly adapted for the Italian prune, will grow a large Italian, and one which the canneries would greatly desire. The climatic conditions in the valley on the whole should be good for early maturity, with high sugar content with this type of prune.

Plums, such as the Green Gage, Reine Claude, Yellow Egg, and Shrop, are splendidly adapted for canning. Soft cherries, such as the large Montmorency and the Kentish, are in good demand, and sweet cherries, such as the Royal Ann and Waterhouse, which will both succeed in the Rogue River valley, are being greatly sought for.

If peaches are to be grown for canning purposes, in addition to such varieties as the Lovell and Mink, which are now being grown, future developments should be along such lines as the Tuscan, Phillips and Death's Cling. Local peach growers would do well to try out any peaches at the present time, however, till it can be ascertained what the peach crop in the Northwest is going to be this season. Indications now point to a very light crop, and if this is true, peach growers may find their crop a bonanza this coming year.

The Rogue River valley should have a well-developed horticultural products business, and a large plant industry development in the bulk home of the business. To do this, however, the growers must begin to diversify their crops. We have eventually to have a well-developed canning in the valley, and we urge our members to get

ready with the tonnage that such a development may come relatively early. It is not feasible to establish extensive canneries to simply handle Pacific prunes and Northwest apples. We need here a varied product, a heavy tonnage, and a long season. Year in and year out the indications are that a large percentage of the berries will bring more money in some than sold fresh, but to realize such a situation, canneries must be established on a basis which means a profitable operation.

Mr. Robert C. Phillips, sales manager of the Oregon Growers' Co-operative association, has just returned from an extended eastern trip. He will, a little later, visit the various districts in which we are to operate, and will meet the members of the organization.
