

### EASTER EGG HUNT FOR CHILDREN AT THE PARK APRIL 3

Last year on the Saturday preceding Easter, Medford had her first Easter trolie for her children. Through one man's efforts, the Roosevelt Parent-Teacher's circle undertook the affair. Everyone was enthusiastic and the merchants, newspapers, and citizens generally were generous and helpful. Also the many mothers who dyed and donated eggs, and the teachers who gave so liberally of their time. It was the hope that from this small beginning an annual Easter holiday might be inaugurated that would bring joy to every little child in the community. Many of our citizens came to look on last year and expressed the hope that we should plan a similar entertainment this year. That hope is to be fulfilled. It is the desire this year to have every child in Medford and the rural school districts between the ages of 3 and 19, inclusive, come to Medford's Easter party in the city park. The date is Saturday, April 3, 1920, and the hours from two until four o'clock.

There will be an Easter egg hunt first. The little tots from 3 to 6

years will have all city park block. Children from 7 to 8 the library block and from 9 to 10 the Washington school grounds. After the hunt is over there will be games and sports. There will be a large committee of ladies on hand to see that all children are well cared for.

Simple track events are planned for all grammar grade pupils, under the supervision of "Dad King," athletic director of the high school. Simple prizes are planned for these contests.

This is to be a community affair and we want everyone to help make it a big success. If you have children, plan to bring them. If you have none, plan to help the neighbor who has, bring her children and come and enjoy the fun. Donations of eggs, candy eggs, chicken eggs, rice or cooked and dyed, goose, duck, turkey or other eggs will be gratefully received. These donations should all be taken to the Medford Furniture and Hardware store some time next week. There are to be prizes given for the most artistic plate of colored eggs. The rules and index for these activities will be announced later.

Put the date in your mind and plan to do something to help make this the happiest day in the memory of our children. And remember, we want eggs and eggs and eggs, from you and you and you.

### LOCAL COMMITTEE WILL REPRESENT STATE UNIVERSITY

They will secure data for the records of the state wide survey as to mental defect, delinquency, and dependency which the legislature requested at its last session when it passed a concurrent resolution asking for this information so as to be able to have accurate figures on the subject as a basis for intelligent legislation in the future. At the request of the extension division of the university, the U. S. Public Health Service is co-operating with the state and has sent Dr. Chester L. Carlisle from Washington, D. C., to Oregon to take charge of the work as director. The headquarters of the survey is the office of the extension division of the University of Oregon at Eugene, to which all correspondence should be addressed.

### PRINCE MAY BE HELD UP BY PANAMA CANAL

**PANAMA, Mar. 25.**—It is doubted here whether a channel sufficient to permit the passage of the British cruiser Renown can be cleared in the Colobra cut by Tuesday next when the Prince of Wales will arrive aboard the warship on his way to Australia.

More than twenty ships are still tied up as the result of the slide in the cut last Saturday.

This afternoon an island fifty feet wide and three feet high is visible above the channel.

### SEE ARMENIAN FILM, REQUEST OF COMMITTEE

What is probably one of the strongest moving pictures that this city has ever witnessed, is "Auction of Souls," which started last evening for a four-day run at the Rialto theatre. Depicting as it does actual occurrences in the martyred little Christian nation—Armenia—so long the victim of Turkish barbarity and cruelty, it carries a message which it is the duty of every American who desires to be well-informed to hear and see.

It is especially appropriate that it should come at this time when the committee on raising funds for Near East Relief work are perfecting their plans for raising the quota of this district for this purpose. Members of the committee witnessed the film yesterday, and they feel sure that no right-minded person can witness this film and not come away with a burning desire to aid in relieving the sufferings of the pitiful remnant of those people who survived the awful ordeal. The committee hopes that everyone possible will see the film, and allow its burning message to sink deep, for it shows far more vividly than mere words can do the things which have been happening in the Near East, and no more than represents the actual conditions there.

### SPARKS FROM THE WIRE

**PARIS, Mar. 25.**—The French government has just appointed a commission charged with the elaboration of an economic accord with Germany.

Continual complaints have been made in French circles that Germany was violating the terms of the peace treaty by discriminating against French buyers.

**WASHINGTON, Mar. 25.**—The note to the allied supreme council outlining the American government's views on the Turkish settlement dispatched today by the state department.

**CHARLESTON, S. C., Mar. 25.**—Three score business men of Charleston took off their coats today and as amateur longshoremen began unloading a 650-ton cargo of general merchandise from the freighter Lake Clear, which had been ordered to return to Baltimore with her consignment intact, because of the longshoremen's strike. It is estimated it will take the volunteers three days to unload the freight and load 100 tons for the return trip.

**WASHINGTON, Mar. 25.**—Legislation designed to bring the government war risk insurance into closer touch with former service men was approved today by the house interstate commerce sub-committee.

**CHICAGO, Mar. 25.**—An extension of time in the law which prohibits shippers from holding stock longer than 28 hours without food or water, was advocated at the session of the National Livestock exchange here today. The conference went on record as favoring the extensions to 35 hours.

**PHILADELPHIA, Mar. 25.**—Todd Daniel, division superintendent of the department of justice and special assistant United States attorney here, has resigned.

**LONDON, Mar. 25.**—The war office today denied that any plan of action had been decided on or even considered, to starve the miners into submission in the event of a strike by the use of the army as a blockading force, as reported by the Daily Herald the labor organ this morning.
